400 grams (14 oz) self-raising flour 175 ml (6 fluid ounces) double cream 175 ml (6 fluid ounces) lemonade (clear or cloudy)

Place all ingredients into mixing bowl and knead lightly until mixed. Turn onto floured board and roll out to 2 cm (3/4 inch) 'ish.

Cut into rounds and bake on lined tray at 220° C / 200° C fan / Mark 7 for 12/15 minutes.

WDS Parish Letter for May 2024

I like May: it's probably my favourite month. It's a month full of promise: the days are getting longer and its light in the evenings. Fingers crossed, we should be past any risk of ice and snow (though our eldest, born on 6th May 1997, arrived in the midst of a blizzard, albeit we were living in the north-east Scotland back then). The sun gets higher in the sky every day and there's a welcome hint of warm days to come when I'm out in the garden – even in the rain!

Mind you, as I write this, I am acutely aware that May isn't such a blessing for some, particularly those in education. For many of our young people, May is the start of exam season, which can be a gruelling and stressful time as they are tested on their previous learning, given that the results of their labours may well ultimately shape their future lives. Spare a thought, too, for all the adults involved: the teachers, support staff, exam invigilators, examiners and of course, the parents, hoping for the best for their children whilst keeping everything crossed. To all of you, good luck: you will be in our thoughts and prayers as you face the oncoming challenges.

One of the best things about May though is that there are two – yes, two – Bank Holidays in the month. The first, the Early May Bank Holiday, will occur on Monday 6th May this year. May day celebrations are traditionally associated with the coming of summer and often involve flowers, music, Morris dancing, the crowning of a May Queen and dancing around a May Pole. Many countries of the world also celebrate their working populations on this day and it has been recognised as a public holiday in this country since 1978. Whatever the reason, the overall aim is for the community to come together and have a good time.

For Christians, more significant is the late May, or Spring Bank Holiday, known in Britain until 1972 as the Whitsun Bank Holiday and which this year will take place on Monday 27th May. Whitsun, or 'White Sunday' is associated with Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit came down 'like tongues of fire' upon the heads of the gathered disciples and left them talking in different languages, enabling all around them to understand them, no matter where they came from. 'Pentecost', originally from a Greek word, means the 'fiftieth day of fifty days of celebration' and marks the end of Easter. Traditionally this was a popular time for baptism: one explanation of 'White Sunday' is that it represents the white robes worn by those coming to be baptised. This too, is also an ideal time for the community to come together in celebration and to have a good time.

Whatever you get up to this May, I hope that the month will be good to you and that you will find time to stop, to enjoy yourself and to look forward to Summer.

Several other 'willing volunteers' are now booking transport in addition to myself. The Health Centre know who is covering at any given time and therefore, although we know it is sometimes difficult to get through, please use the Health Centre number to request transport.

Can I explain once again the system in place for arranging transport to Health Centre only appointments?

I put together a rota of drivers for each working day of the month and this is sent to the Health Centre. When you book an appointment and you know that you will need transport, please mention it while at the reception desk or on the telephone. Your name will be added to the list for the day of your appointment and the driver is called the previous evening with a list of patients to pick up together with addresses and appointment times.

AS I HAVE NO ACCESS TO THE DIARY I CAN'T BOOK TRANSPORT FOR HEALTH CENTRE APPOINTMENTS.

I think this is worth repeating as I'm still getting calls about transport to the Health Centre.

We are getting several offers of plants for our plant sale at the Welton May Fair on Monday 6th May but we would still like some more please! If anyone has any plants, indoor or outdoor, which they are willing to donate please get in touch. Collection can be arranged. If you are splitting a large plant in your garden, we are happy to take any surplus. We will be open for business when the fare opens at midday so please come along and have a look.

Ask my GP has recently been revised and I thought it might help patients to understand further what the benefits are the reasons behind making changes. I hope that you find this helpful.

Custom Action Buttons – A Patient Guide:

Sick/fit note request – For patients to be able to request a repeat sick note or fit note. This is for ongoing issues. If you have not yet spoken to a clinician regarding your illness you must do this first via the consult a clinician tab.

Blood test appointment – This is for patients that know they are due or have been asked to book a blood test appointment by the GP or hospital. If you use this request button, a link will be sent out for you to book your appointment. This is not for patients to request a blood test for a new medical problem or self-refer.

Appointment cancellation – to cancel any appointments at the practice only. Please note this must be done in a timely manner.

Request Results – For patients to request results that they would usually ring for. For example, bloods, urine, stool. You are also able to enquire about x-rays and scans. Please note these are also available for patients to view on the online access to records.

Annual Medication Review – These are for patients to be able to request an appointment for a medication review. Patients should ensure they have booked in for their bloods and BP before the review appointment.

Medication Query – This is to be used to contact the dispensary if you have any queries regarding to your current medication or acute medication. This cannot be used for repeat medication queries. *Not yet live but will be very shortly.

Referral Queries – For any queries relating to an outstanding referral that you have. These requests will go directly to the secretary. This is not to be used for any new referral requests or to advise of new symptoms relating to an on-going referral. New symptoms or requests must go to a clinician.

The custom tabs will be open for patients from 8am-1pm each day and hopefully this will help in thelong term increase the clinical capacity and lengthen the opening times on AskmyGP. This new system will hopefully reduce the phone calls into the practice and therefore decrease the telephone waiting times.

What's in a word - Pedigree

In its origins, pedigree is associated not with graceful blue-blooded racehorses, but with those ungainly birds, the cranes. The Old French phrase *pie de grue*, literally *"crane's foot"* was a splayed three-line mark used to indicate succession in a genealogical tree. This mark resembled the shape of a crane's foot; hence the name. It was only in Middle English, as *pedegru*, that the three-word phrase fused into a single word. The ending changed from *-gru* to *-gree* as a result of the influence of the word *degree*.

Lincolnshire Dragons

Tales of Old Lincolnshire Adrian Gray

Of course, many so-called sophisticated people nowadays believe there was never any such thing as a dragon, but those dedicated to the folklore of Lincolnshire know that this is wrong. There were dragons in Lincolnshire and no less a person than King Henry i granted a coat of arms to a Lincolnshire man in recognition of that fact!

Many hundreds of years ago a dragon lived near Castle Carlton, a few miles outside Louth, It was a particularly ferocious beast, with a very nasty and forbidding appearance. It had a long, scaly body in the usual dragon colour scheme of grey and green. It had short legs, which were clad in iron, and a long, lashing tail that it could use as a powerful weapon. The dragon's head had only one eye, the size of a pudding basin, which blazed out like a raging fire.

The dragon was well-protected by both its natural scales and the iron armour that it wore, making it virtually impossible to kill. Indeed it only had one weak spot, a small wart on its right thigh; if this was pierced by a lance or a sword, the dragon would die - but it was protected by three layers of brass armour.

It was said that the dragon lived at "Wormesgay", worm being an old word for dragon. This place, which was certainly near Louth, may have been the same as modern-day Walmsgate, where a long barrow is said to contain the body of a dragon. Ignorant people often think that dragons killed men and beasts by breathing fire on them, but in fact this Lincolnshire dragon wreaked havoc on the neighbourhood byu using its poisonous breath. The dragon only had to exhale a blast of its foul odours and all living creatures would die, while trees and plants withered and shrivelled away.

Obviously the existence of a dragon in the neighbourhood did no good for property values, for the dragon killed all the animals and crops so that landowners could hardly demand rent from their peasants. South Ormsby, in particular was devastated. Eventually one of the landowners, Sir Hugh Barde, decided that he must tackle the foul creature once and for all.

Sir Hugh chose to fight the creature on a wedding day, for such days were said to have special powers for good. Although the dragon lived several miles inland, Sir Hugh chose to stand his ground at a point several miles further east, beside the sea. Being a knight, he prepared himself carefully, and spent a long time with a priest praying for divine help. As soon as the dragon saw Sir Hugh it flew at him in a fury enraged that one man should dare to challenge it. Just as the dragon was about to strike, there was an instantaneous and dramtic change in the weather - a torrent of rain burst from the sky, the sun was blotted out by black clouds, a mighty thunderclap rolled across the heavens and a flash of lightning struct the ground close by.

For a moment, the mighty dragon was frightened by the storm and hesitated in its attack. Sir Hugh, concentrating with all his might, saw the dragon perfectly silhouetted against the lightning flash. The lightning was reflected off the brass guard covering the dragon's wart, and in an instant Sir Hugh struck out at the dragon's one weakness. His sword cut clean through the brass armour and plunged deep into the dragon's flesh.

The dragon screamed so loudly that the sound was heard twelve miles away on the Wolds, but though it was dying it did not give up the battle. It threw itself around and began a second attack on the knight. Just as it seemed that Sir High would be killed, there was another flash of lightning and a great echoing clap of thunder. The dragon veered off in horror and fear, then collapsed dying on the beach.

Sir Hugh watched as the great beast died, then advanced and cut off its head to make sure the deed was complete. He then took the head to King Henry, who was mightily pleased at such an unusual present. He gave Sir Hugh permission to change his name to Bardolfe or Bardolph, granted him the right to bear a coat of arms featuring a dragon and gave him a number of other rights too by way of financial reward. These included being able to take a tax of a horn of salt from every cart of salt that came up from the sea and crossed his lands on its way along the old salt road to the inland towns.

There is another dragon story associated with Anwick near Sleaford. One day a man was ploughing his field, just as he had done year by year for as long as he could remember. Suddenly, though the ground beneath his feet began to sink away and his horses and plough began to disappear into a quicksand.

Well, the man was astonished, for he had ploughed the field many times before and nothing like this had ever happened. His first thought was for self-preservation and he leapt away from the treacherous ground. He tried to reach out for the reins, to pull his horse and plough to safety, but it was too late. He could only watch in despair as the horse was swallowed up by the ground with a horrible sucking sound.

Just as the horse and plough disappeared from view, there was a great roar and a dragon came bursting out of the quicksand. It flashed overhead, circled the field, then flew away at great speed.

The man ran home as fast as he could, but it is doubtful if many in the village believed his story, though there was certainly a puzzle over where his horse and plough had gone to. They probably reckoned that he had supped too greedily at his lunchtime beer, but the next day he was able to persuade a few friends to return to the field with him.

Imagine his misery when there was no sign of a quicksand in the field at all! His friends laughed and joked, jumping up and down on the supposed spot to show that the ground was solid

and firm. And yet, they all agreed, there did seem to be something of a hollow there, which none of them could remember having noticed before. Also, and to the ploughman this seemed to prove his case, in the middle of the hollow lay a large boulder which bore an uncanny resemblance to a dragon's head.

The boulder convinced those who had doubted the story, and it soon became the subject of much local interest. It was called the Drake Stone, "drake" being a simplified version of the word dragon. Wise local people would tell you that treasure was buried beneath the stone, but if anyone tried to move the stone to get the treasure the dragon would reappear to scare them away or even kill them.

Another dragon is said to have lived at Buslingthorpe, between Lincoln and Market Rasen. It was slain by a knight called Sir John Buslingthorpe, who was awarded 400 acres of local land for his trouble. The land became known as Lissington Pasture.



JANE'S RECIPE FOR MAY

Ingredients

6 eggs, whisked 200g new potatoes, cut in to guarters

- 100g asparagus
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1tbsp olive oil
- Rocket, to serve



Method

- Heat grill to high. Put the potatoes in a pan of cold salted water and bring to the boil. Once boiling, cook for 4-5 mins until nearly tender, then add in the asparagus for around 30 seconds - 1 minute at the end. Drain and leave to stand.
- 2. Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large frying pan and add the onion. Cook this off until softened.
- Pour mixed eggs over the onion in the pan, then add the asparagus and potatoes. Place under the grill for 5 mins or until golden and cooked through. Cut into wedges and serve from the pan with salad.

The following is a summary of the Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, 9th April 2024. 7 councillors present, the clerk, 2 residents & WLDC Cllr B Velan

Report from WLDC Cllr B Velan

All emails and phone calls I received from Scothern residents who have been affected by Flooding have been reported to WLDC officers and discussed with LCC. WLDC officers hold regular meetings with officers from the LCC Lead Local Flood Authority & Highways teams and the work in the area is ongoing. A meeting with the Emergency Planning and Business Continuity Officer at LCC, discussed the benefits of setting up a Community Emergency Plan for Scothern. The plan requires a minimum of three volunteers, who would have direct access to emergency contacts 24/7, the ability to identify vulnerable residents who require specific support. Volunteers would receive free training, emergency exercises, and a kit worth £300 (including radios, hi-vis vests, and other equipment). An emergency plan needs to be completed and reviewed annually, hopefully volunteers can be found as it would be a great benefit to the Parish Council and its residents in the event of emergencies, such as flooding.

Bus Survey

Scothern Parish Council has been working collaboratively with Lincolnshire County Council to review the provision of Public Transport to and from Scothern, to identify the current demand for services. If residents could complete the survey when delivered and this information will help to plan for future provision.
