December is the twelfth and final month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian calendars. Its length is 31 days.

December's name derives from the Latin word *decem* (meaning ten) because it was originally the tenth month of the year in the calendar of Romulus c. 750 BC, which began in March. The winter days following December were not included as part of any month. Later, the months of January and February were created out of the monthless period and added to the beginning of the calendar, but December retained its name.

There are several significant historical dates in December some of which changed the world forever: **1791** - Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart died a pauper at age 35 in Vienna, Austria. During his brief life, he created over 600 musical compositions and is widely considered one of the finest composers who ever lived.

1919 - Lady Nancy Astor became the first woman in the British House of Commons.

1942 - The Beveridge Report was published in Britain envisioning the welfare state including insurance for the entire population.

1990 - England was connected to mainland Europe for the first time since the Ice Age as engineers digging a railway tunnel under the English Channel broke through the last rock layer.

Please be aware that Lincolnshire Police have been receiving more reports of a doorstep scam in the area.

A group of persons in a white van with various decals and phone numbers written on, are cold calling at properties offering to

pressure wash roof tops and carry out roofing/building work for extortionate amounts of money. They are described as being very insistent and are not offering a legitimate service. Follow these guidelines to stay safe:

- 1. Always check a caller's identity. If you are not happy about their identity, do not let them into your house under any circumstances.
- 2. Never leave your front door open/unlocked and unattended, so a second individual can enter without your knowledge.
- 3. Take time to consider your options and research costs from other providers. If in doubt contact your local Trading Standards.
- 4. If you feel pressured by any cold caller, have the confidence to be firm and say NO.
- 5. Legitimate businesses do not tend to call door to door.
- 6. Never pay for goods or services you have not received.
- 7. A legitimate company will give you a written quotation and allow for a cooling off period.
- 8. If you feel frightened or intimidated, contact the Police on 101, or in an emergency dial 999.

Jane's December Recipe



Easy Mince Pies

METHOD



For the pear and cranberry mincemeat

300g/10¹/₂oz mincemeat 25g/1oz dried cranberries 1 large orange, zest only 1/2 pear, cored and finely diced, no need to peel

For the sloe apple mincemeat

1 eating apple, peeled, cored and grated 300g/101/20z mincemeat, sieved to remove most of the syrup 1 tbsp sloe gin

For the spiced nut mincemeat

300g/10½oz mincemeat 25g/1oz walnuts, finely chopped ¹/₂ tsp ground cinnamon 1 tsp almond liqueur, such as amaretto

For the mince pies

plain flour, for dusting 500g/1lb 2oz pack ready-made puff pastry 1 large free-range egg, beaten 350g/12oz mincemeat (choose your favourite flavour from the suggestions above) golden granulated or demerara sugar, for sprinkling

- First choose which mincemeat flavour you'd like, then simply 1. mix the ingredients together and set aside.
- 2. For the mince pies, dust work surface and a rolling pin with a little flour, and roll out the pastry to £1 coin thickness. Stamp out the twelve lids first using a 7cm/2³/₄in round cutter. Now stamp out twelve bases using a 9cm/31/2 in cutter – you will need to re-roll the trimmings to get all twelve bases.
- 3. Push the pastry bases into the holes of a 12-hole fairy cake tin, then press the excess pastry flat around the rim to make a border. Brush some of the egg around the rims of the pastry, then spoon the mincemeat into the cases - you'll want about 1¹/₂ tablespoons in each. Lay the pastry lids on top and press firmly around the edges to seal to the base. Use the 7cm/23/4in cutter to re-stamp the tops, neatening the edges and sealing at the same time. Brush the tops with the rest of the beaten egg, then sprinkle with the sugar. Use a small, sharp knife to poke a small hole in the top of each pie. Chill the pies for 15 minutes while you heat the oven to 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6.
- Bake in the middle of the oven for 20 minutes, or until risen 4 and pale golden-brown - don't overcook or your pies might pop! Allow to cool for 5 minutes before carefully lifting from the tin, then serve warm or cold.





SCOTHERN SPEED WATCH

Below are the figures for the vehicles (and speeds) for vehicles passing through Scothern from 5 October 2024 to 3 November 2024 a total of 29 days.

Sign 1 on Dunholme Road

A total of 48,900 came into the village (average 1686 per day) 98% less than 40mph and 51215 left the village (average 1,766 per day) 97% less than 40 mph. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 77 mph and outgoing 109 mph (11 October 2024 17:36).

Sign 2 on Sudbrooke Road

A total of 51,383 came into the village (average 1,772 per day) 91% less than 40mph and 38692 left the village (average 1,334 per day) 88% less than 40mph. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 122mph (11 October 2024 11:12) / 116 mph (24 October 2024 06:45) / 97 mph (18 October 2024 12:02) and outgoing 82mph.

Sign 3 on Main Street

A total of 12,136 came into the village (average 418per day) 99% less than 40mph and 13,880 left the village (average 479 per day) 99% less than 40&. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 62mph and outgoing 54mph.

Do some of the speeds above horrify you?

If you would like to help to reduce the speeding and you can spare a few hours a month, why not join the speed watch group? Volunteers are fully trained and go out in groups of three.

'It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas' goes the song by Michael Bublé. But it all depends on what you understand by the word 'Christmas'. The word itself is condensed from two words, Christ's Mass, where Christ is Jesus and Mass is the Communion service celebrated in churches.

As the song unfolds the artist refers to the items he imagines Christmas to be about - the candy canes, dolls that talk, hopalong boots and a pistol that shoots. It ties in with all the adverts which are on overdrive at the moment as retailers compete for the increased sales that occur each Christmas. Retailers pressurise us to buy this year's goods which experience tells us, may get little or no use, but might make us feel happy in the short term.

And yet, the items in the song are not the first thing I think of when I hear the word *Christmas*. As a minister I think of Christmas as God making himself known to us. The birth of a baby in Bethlehem provides us with a story for understanding humanity. Due to the town being overcrowded, the unmarried mother Mary gives birth in a smelly stable. The baby is given the name Jesus (which means *the Lord Saves*) and Immanuel (meaning *God with us*).

As we know well, there is a bleaker aspect to Christmas. Debt, illness, homelessness and bereavement feel harder to bear when we are told "tis the season to be jolly". Likewise, war and conflict rage on regardless.

The deeper meaning of this Baby, born into poverty far from home, is that God is with us whatever our circumstances, throughout the full range of life's experiences. To know the One who also experienced the ups and downs of life in this world, is the message of hope this Christmas season: God with us.

On this day in Lincolnshire

(The Little Book of Lincolnshire - Lucy Wood)

13 December 1286 - Overnight, a great flood affected the east coast from Lincolnshire to Essex. The Church of St Peter's in Mablethorpe was destroyed. There was another flood on 13 January 1287 that claimed many lives and another the following year on 4 February 1288.

16 December 1943 - An RAF attack on Berlin became known as Black Thursday when 25 Lancasters were lost and others crashed on their way home in fog. Overall, 483 Lancasters and 10 Mosquito bombers took part in the attack, including 17 Lancasters from 100 Squadron and 15 from 550 Squadron, both based at RAF Waltham near Grimsby. As the crews neared the airfield on their return visibility was poor. At 11pm, Lancaster HW-H crashed at Ratcliffe Top, less than 4 miles from home. The pilot and three crew members perished and three injured. Around the same time, 100 Squadron commander David Halford crashed while trying to land at RAF Kelstern. He and four crew members were killed. Two were thrown clear of the explosion but badly injured. At 11:19pm the first Lancaster successfully landed at RAF Waltham, while others continued circling. At 12:40am on 17 December, two 100 Squadron Lancasters crashed in fog over Waithe. One aircraft hit the ground on fire and six crew members died but a resident bravely rescued rear gunner Sergeant Wallace. Tragically, he died in hospital in January 1944. The other aircraft fell near Grainsby Church and all crew perished.

Cllr Sue Rawlins – Spoke regarding the Devolution of Lincolnshire going ahead; the S19 Flooding investigations are very slow and a reduction in speed has been requested for the A158 Sudbrooke junction following a survey in the area in the summer.

Flooding prevention updates – The beck was cleared by 3rd Witham Drainage Board end of October and in November, Anglian Water has scheduled repairs to the cracked pipes and intruding connections on Craypool Lane to Main Street

Grant Funding 2025 – requests were received from the Scothern Recreation Centre to cut the playing field grass and also from St Germains Church to cut the churchyard. Both these were approved by the council.
