Overall, the new format seems to have been a success with residents of Scothern and, I believe, nearby Sudbrooke.

January is the first month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian calendars. Its length is 31 days. The first day of the month is known as New Year's Day. It is, on average, the coldest month of the year within most of the Northern Hemisphere (where it is the second month of winter) and the warmest month of the year within most of the Southern Hemisphere (where it is the second month of summer). In the Southern hemisphere, January is the seasonal equivalent of July in the

Northern hemisphere and vice versa.

There are several significant historical dates in January some of which changed the world forever:

The following all happened on the **1 January** which is the most celebrated holiday around the world.

- 1660 Samuel Pepys began is famous diary in which he chronicled life in London including the Great Plague of 1664-65 and the Great Fire of 1666.
- 1801 Ireland was added to Great Britain by an Act of Union thus creating the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.
- 1877 Queen Victoria was proclaimed Empress of India.
- 1958 The European Economic Community (ECC) known as the Common Market was formed by Belgium, France, West Germany, Italy, Luxembourg and The Netherlands in order to remove trade barriers and co-ordinate trade policies. Britain, Ireland and Denmark became members in 1973.
- 1999 Eleven European nations began using a new single currency, the Euro for electronic financial and business transactions. *(Can you name them answers on the back page!)*

Thank You From Scothern Players

During the wet and windy weekend evenings at the end of November and the beginning of December, many intrepid theatre goers braved the elements to attend Scothern Village Hall. The event was to celebrate 30 years of the Scothern Players – a group of people with the collective interest of putting on a show.



To mark this landmark year, we had chosen the Yorkshire comedy "When We Are Married" by J.B. Priestley. A play that had been warmly received and fondly remembered when first performed in 2007. Several of the cast had been in the original production and were keen to prove that they still "had it in them".

It was a play that grew on the participants as rehearsals progressed. Once scripts were down and accents (sometimes dodgy!) were established, the story and the comedy emerged. The team designing and building the scenery were aware of the high standard expected of them and worked hard to produce a sitting room that would have made any Alderman proud – complete with period furniture, paintings, bell-pull and even a stuffed bird. Yorkshire circa 1908 had come to Scothern!

Casting of the play was nearly perfect with each actor growing into their role and flourishing. We were inspired by a number of new members, several who had done little acting before, who not only held their own, but often shone. Technical roles and front of house staff also saw additions of new personnel who lifted the whole production.



Audiences were appreciative and responsive. Comments after each show were very positive with many people not expecting the number of laughs that the script contained. Costumes, direction, set and even the acting came in for praise. The Players were delighted that the public were "thoroughly entertained".

So, thank you to all those intrepid residents of Scothern and the surrounding villages who supported our production and we hope that we did enough to encourage attendance at future shows. Without audience support we could not continue and it would be nice to achieve another 30 years!

Scothern Play Area

Many of you use the play area and those who have lived in the village for some time, will know that the swings and slide have been pieces of equipment for many, many years; giving children many hours of pleasure and enjoyment.

It is with sadness that everyone has to be advised that the swings and slide have unfortunately been highlighted as requiring repairs (noted in our annual RoSPA inspection) that will be costly as the manufacturer of both pieces went out of business about 25 years ago and therefore, any replacement parts would need to be custom made.

The decision has been made that for the safety and wellbeing of all users, these two pieces of play equipment are to be removed and this will take place over the next couple of months.

The Parish Council is aiming to replace the swings with a newer version that will meet the RoSPA regulations and research is ongoing for items of play equipment that we can replace the slide with (for example, a see saw).

The Parish Council will be putting a notice on the two pieces of equipment stating that neither should be used. We ask that you please abide with this request. We do understand that it will be difficult to explain this to the children, but safe use is paramount.

Another year has passed by. I hope you all have had a good Christmas, with some thought perhaps about the true meaning of Christmas. A few years ago I came across the following article in a parish magazine, I feel it delivers quite a powerful message and would like to share it with you, the author is unknown,

THE CRACKED POT

A water-bearer in India had two large pots, hung on each end of a pole which he carried across his neck. One of the pots had a crack in it, and while the other pot was perfect and always delivered a full portion of water at the end of the long walk from the stream to the master's house, the cracked pot arrived only half full. For a whole two years this went on daily, with the bearer delivering only one and a half pots full of water in his master's house.

Of course, the perfect pot was proud of its accomplishments, but the cracked pot was ashamed of its own imperfections, and miserable that it was able to accomplish only half of what it had been made to do. After two years of what it perceived to be a bitter failure, it spoke to the water-bearer one day by the stream.

"I am ashamed of myself, and I want to apologise to you."

"Why?" asked the bearer, "what are you ashamed of?"

"I have been able, for these past two years, to deliver only half my load because this crack in my side causes water to leak out all the way back to your master's house. Because of my flaws, you have to do all of this work and you don't get full value for your efforts," the pot said.

The water-bearer felt sorry for the old cracked pot and in his compassion, he said, "As we return to the master's house, I want you to notice the beautiful flowers along the path". Indeed, as they went up the hill, the old cracked pot took notice of the sun warming the beautiful wild flowers on the side of the path, and this cheered it somewhat. But at the end of the trail, it still felt bad because it had leaked out half its load, and so again it apologised to the bearer for its failure.

The bearer said to the pot, "Did you notice that there were flowers only on your side of the path but not on the other pot's side? That's because I have always known about your flaw, and I took advantage of it. I sowed flower seeds on your side of the path, and every day when we walked back from the stream you've watered them. For two years I have been able to pick these beautiful flowers to decorate my master's table. Without you being just the way you are, he would not have this beauty to grace his house."

If you've seen something online or in an email or text You can use our online tool to get advice. <u>https://www.lincolnshirealert.co.uk/Content/Pages/Latest-Alerts</u> Our tool will ask you questions and use your answers to give you advice on:

Recognising a scam

- It might be a scam if:
- it seems too good to be true for example, a holiday that's much cheaper than you'd expect
- someone you don't know contacts you unexpectedly
- you suspect you're not dealing with a real company for example, if there's no postal address
- you've been asked to transfer money quickly
- you've been asked to pay in an unusual way for example, by iTunes vouchers or through a transfer service like MoneyGram or Western Union
- you've been asked to give away personal information like passwords or PINs
- you haven't had written confirmation of what's been agreed
- If you get a message that asks you to pay to get the parcel or reschedule the delivery, it's usually a scam. Don't click any links in the text or email. Delivery companies won't ask you to pay them through a link in an email or text.

If you think you've paid too much for something

Paying more for something than you think it's worth isn't the same as being scammed. Usually, a scam will involve theft or fraud.

You have other rights contact the Citizen's Advice Bureau (CAB) (www.citizensadvice.org.uk)

If you've given away money or information because of a scam, there are things you should do. Contact CAB as above.

If you think someone is calling to trick you into giving them money or your personal details, hang up and call 159. This is a secure service that connects you directly with your bank.

Calls to 159 are usually charged at the national rate - it depends on your provider.

On this day in Lincolnshire.....

(The Little Book of Lincolnshire - Lucy Wood)

5 January 1945 Beachcomber Marshall Haley discovered the "Mablethorpe Find", a haul of bronze Roman coins in an earthenware bowl. The coins were dated by the British Museum as from varying reigns of emperors, from Augustus in 27BC to Constantinious in AD361. It wasn't Marshall's only success in discovery; in 1935 he found the remains of an Anglo-Saxon village in Mablethorpe.

15 January 1943 Lincoln endured its worst air raid of the Second World War. A lone Dornier dropped incendiary and phosphorous bombs, killing four people and wounding thirty. A bomb dropped in Thomas Street exploded two days later and destroyed seventeen homes.

26 January 1899 Skegness's first motor car made its debut. It was purchased by garage owner Bill Berry, Lion Hotel landlord Freddy Kirkby, Whale Museum owner Joe Wingate and Richard Lloyd to provide tourist rides. Their journey from London to Lincolnshire to bring home the Daimler - which had a top speed of 12mph - took three and a half days! (*Imagine that journey these days!*)

Little Book of Lincolnshire - Lucy Wood

January Recipe

Wold Carrot Cake (courtesy of Bette Vickers Bread 'n' if it.....)

METHOD

INGREDIENTS

- 8 oz plain flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- Pinch mace
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 4 oz grated carrot
- Grated rind half orange
- 2 tablespoons orange juice
- 4 oz softened butter
- 5 oz castor sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 oz chopped hazelnuts
- Lemon or orange icing made with 12 oz
- icing sugar and juice

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 180oC/300oF/Gas mark 4
- 2. Grease two small loaf tins and line with greaseproof paper
- 3. Sift flour with baking powder, cinnamon, a pinch of mace and salt
- 4. Mix the grated carrots with the orange rind and juice and set aside
- 5. Cream the butter. Gradually beat in the sugar until the mixture is white and fluffy. Beat in the eggs one at a time.
- 6. With a wooden spoon, beat in the carrot and orange mixture
- 7. Mix in the flour, spices and chopped nuts.
- 8. Divide the mixture between the two tins, smoothing the top
- 9. Bake for 30 minutes or until well risen, firm to the touch and pulling away from the sides
- 10. While still warm, pour over the icing and allow to soak in.

Sounds delicious ...

When Britain stood along and the food supplies were scarce, the cries were "Dig for Victory" and "Save For All You're Worth". Flower beds and treasured shrubs were dug up and replaced by vegetables and fruit trees.

Older men and women, whose husbands were at war, produced a harvest that was used in all manner of recipes.

In Lincolnshire, the carrots grew in abundance. Many neighbours joined forces and formed a communal base which also supplied those without gardens.

One year, the small Lincolnshire Wolds village had more than they could cope with. Finally, they left heaps of carrots at the gates with a notice saying "Please help yourself". Even that couldn't move them.

Then one day in 1944, the village was invaded by a convoy of soldiers from the Royal Army Service Corps who made full use of the carrots.

Before the war the chef had been at a leading London hotel, and he made the carrots into thick soup and tasty salads. The women watched with interest as he worked in the field kitchen. "Seems you can make owt out of carrots," smiled Patsy Yates. "I could make you an excellent cake if I had an oven" he said.

Within seconds he was offered the use of at least a dozen! He made a plain but very tasty cake with the ingredients available. It became known as "Wold Carrot Cake" and won many prizes at agricultural and horticultural shows.

Bread 'n' if it

When I was a child, at a time of great hardship in the countryside. I recall asking: "What's for tea, Mam." She used to say "Bread 'n' if it - if yer get it you'll be lucky."

Often 'it' consisted of bread and bacon fat or dripping.

Now I am a magpie and hoard everything; old letters envelopes, exercise books and especially cookery books for which I have a great passion.

I was having a clear out when I found a box full of what appeared to be bits of paper.

They were recipes, written on backs of envelopes, letters and writing pads. There was also a collection of old magazines and cookery books with recipes, which took me back to those bread 'n' if it days: Ada's Vinegar Cake, Nan-nan's toffee, Cut And Come Again Cake, Sid's Beef Stew and many more. As far as I am concerned, they are a gold mine.

My imagination went to work and I began to recall many of the stories I had heard from family and friends, so I decided to write a cookery book with a difference, blending recipes and stories.

The tales are based on fact and as with all country stories, have a moral.

Some of the recipes are more than 150 years old.

Bette lived in Ingham and died in 2007 aged 74 after a long career in journalism.

SCOTHERN SPEED WATCH

Below are the figures for the vehicles (and speeds) for vehicles passing through Scothern from 4 November 2024 to 6 December 2024 a total of 33 days.

Sign 1 on Dunholme Road

A total of 52,891 came into the village (average 1,603 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 64,793 left the village (average 1,963 per day) 97% less than 40 mph. The maximum speeds recorded: incoming 66 mph and outgoing 83 mph (18 |November 2024 11;51).

Sign 2 on Sudbrooke Road

A total of 49,218 came into the village (average 1,419 per day) 91% less than 40mph and 36,683 left the village (average 1,112 per day) 89% less than 40mph. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 116mph (8 November 2024 14:33) and outgoing 86 mph (15 November 2024).

Sign 3 on Main Street

A total of 23,049 came into the village (average 698 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 24,730 left the village (average 749 per day) 99% less than 40&. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 52mph and outgoing 88 mph (29 November 2024 / 10:47).

Do these speeds horrify you?

If you would like to help to reduce the speeding and you can spare a few hours a month, why not join the speed watch group? Volunteers are fully trained and go out in groups of three.

WELTON PDA

NEW YEAR – NEW CHALLENGE (Basically a volunteer driver appeal)

Is anyone reading this or does anyone reading this know someone who might be willing to be a PDA volunteer driver. I currently have 24 volunteers who provide a much - needed service for the patients of Welton Health Centre. I'm not sure whether everyone knows but the practice currently covers 22 villages many of which have no transport links to get them to medical appointments. Just to give you an idea, in the 12 months October 2023 to September 2024 the drivers travelled 20,994 miles transporting 1,546 patients. Volunteers are DBS checked which is a painless free of charge process and drivers can choose how much or how little they would like to commit to. Some drivers commit to a day or two every month just to take patients to the health centre, others will also take patients to local hospitals-Lincoln Louth, Boston, Grimsby etc and there are also drivers who prefer the longer journeys which could be pretty much anywhere in the country but Nottingham, Sheffield, Barlborough and Hull are the ones we visit most often.

What about payment I hear you ask! Drivers receive 45p per mile funded partly by the patient and partly through the PDA fund raising efforts. If anyone would like to consider this as a way of giving back to the community, please give me a call on the number below with any questions you might have. I look forward to hearing from you!!

The Christmas lunch was held on 6th December when we catered for 100 diners. The choir from St Marys School, Welton entertained us prior to the meal with a selection of Christmas songs which was enjoyed by everyone. The raffle and cake stall were very well supported and the final profit for PDA funds was £734 after deduction for food, turkey and village hall hire. The crackers were kindly donated by SCIS and the potatoes by Welton Chippy.

At the Welton Christmas Market and turning on of the tree on Sunday 1st December, Jane and David ran a stall with children's games. It was a cold 3 hours not helped by the gazebo which had a mind of it's own and refused to stay up. They raised £40 for PDA funds, thanks to everyone who supported them.

As the news has to be submitted early due to printing restraints I will report on the Christmas Raffle next month.

Extraordinary uses for Ordinary things (thanks to Reader's Digest)

Strip paint or varnish - for an easy way to remove paint or varnish from wooden or metal furniture, try using a can of OVEN CLEANER; it costs less than commercial paint strippers and is easier to apply (that is if you spray rather than brush it on). After applying scrub off the old paint with a wire brush. Neutralise the stripped surface by coating it with vinegar and then wash it off with clean water. Allow the wood or metal to thoroughly dry before repainting.
WARNING: never use oven cleaner to strip antiques or expensive furnishings it may seriously darken the wood or discolour the metal.

Regenerate a car battery - if a car battery is starting to sound as if it won't turn over, and you are worried that you'll be stuck the next time you try to start your car, give the battery a little more life with this potion. Dissolve about 30g of **EPSOM SALTS** in warm water and add it to each battery cell.

Remove hair-spray residue - dried on hair spray can be tough to remove from walls and mirrors, but even a build-up of residue is no match for a solution of 1 part **LIQUID FABRIC SOFTENER** to 2 parts water. Stir to blend, pour into a spray bottle, squirt the surface and polish with a dry cloth.

Clean artificial flowers - silk flowers are actually quite rare these days, but regardless of whether they're made of silk or other fabric, you can easily freshen them up by placing them in a paper bag with 50g SALT. Give the bag a few gentle shakes and your flowers will emerge as clean as the day you bought them
