The second month of the year is probably most notable for both Valentine's Day and Black History Month. February is also the shortest month of the year, with only 28 days (unless it's a leap year – in which case there are 29 days.

St Valentine is the patron saint of **lovers, people with epilepsy, and beekeepers**. By some accounts,

St. Valentine was a Roman priest and physician who

was martyred during the persecution of Christians by the emperor Claudius II Gothicus about 270.

February is named after a Roman purification festival called februa, which occurred around the fifteenth of this month. Februa literally means "month of cleansing" – a fitting title considering that February was once the last month of the year.

There are several significant historical dates in February some of which changed the world forever:

- **1865** President Abraham Lincoln signed the 13th Amendment to the United States Constitution, officially abolishing slavery.
- **1952** Queen Elizabeth II ascended to the throne of the United Kingdom. Though, her actual coronation took place on 2 June 1953.
- **1953** James Watson and Francis Crick discovered the structure of DNA. James Watson and Francis Crick's discovery of DNA's structure in the 1950s was a major scientific milestone. Their model showed that DNA is made up of two long chains of nucleotides going in opposite directions. The helical structure explains how genetic information can be copied and stored. Furthermore, DNA discovery led to progress in genetic tests, molecular biology, and medical discoveries.
- **2004** Mark Zuckerberg created the Facebook social media platform whilst he was a sophomore at Harvard. Zuckerberg had built Facebook to connect Harvard students with one another. By the next day, over a thousand people had registered, which was only the beginning. Today, Facebook has roughly 2.91 billion monthly users.

Napoleon Bonaparte (1769-1821)

A Lincolnshire Saint

The fourth of February is the commemoration of Gilbert of Sempringham, founder of the Order of Gilbertines. Gilbert was born between 1083 and 1089 at Sempringham in the Lincolnshire Fens between Bourne and Heckington. His father Jocelin was a wealthy Norman knight and his mother name unknown was an Anglo Saxon of humble origin. Gilbert suffered with a physical disability (possibly curvature of the spine) ruling out a military career so instead he was sent to France to study. After spending time abroad where he became a teacher, he returned to Lincolnshire where he was bestowed with the livings of Sempringham and Tirington by his father although he was not an ordained priest. Gilbert received the support of the Bishop of Lincoln Robert Bloet where he became a clerk in the bishop's household. In 1123 the new bishop Alexander ordained Gilbert deacon and priest retaining his services. The revenues Gilbert received from Tirington he devoted to the poor. In 1131 following the death of his father Gilbert returned to Sempringham as lord of the manor and owner of the estate.

The same year Gilbert founded the Gilbertine Order and had renewed his acquaintance with a group of seven women, whom he had met in his earlier teaching career. The women desired to live a life of devotion to God and Gilbert offered the women a 'rule of life' based on the Rule of St Benedict which required seclusion and solitude. The Order received the support of the Bishop of Lincoln and grew rapidly. Thirteen houses were founded during Gilbert's life, four of which were for men only.

Gilbert was a supporter of Thomas Becket, the Archbishop of Canterbury and in 1164 helped him to escape to France from King Henry the Second by disguising him as a Gilbertine monk spending time in their houses before crossing the sea.

In 1165 he was summoned before Henry the Second's justices at Westminster charged with having sent help to the exiled Thomas Becket. He was offered to take an oath that he hadn't done so, but Gilbert refused as an oath to that effect may make him appear an enemy to the archbishop. Gilbert was resigned to a sentence of exile but on hearing his explanation the King pardoned him, and he obtained immunity for himself and his order.

In 1170 when Gilbert was already an aging man some of his lay brothers revolted spreading false accusations about him.

Following fierce controversy, he was eventually vindicated by Pope Alexander the Third. Advancing years persuaded Gilbert to stand down from the supervision of his order and he appointed Roger, prior of Malton as his successor.

A special custom developed in the houses of the order called "the plate of the Lord Jesus". The best portions of the dinner were put on a special plate and shared with the poor, which reflected Gilbert's lifelong concern for less fortunate people.

Following his death over a hundred years old in 1189 some twelve years later following the request of Hubert Walter Archbishop of Canterbury, he was canonized by Pope Innocent the Third, his remains were moved to an honourable place in the church at Sempringham, his shrine becoming a place of pilgrimage.

FROM THE LITTLE BOOK OF LINCOLNSHIRE (LUCY WOOD)

On this day in Lincolnshire.....

2 February 1829 Robbers targeted Halstead Hall, near Stixwould, bursting in on Mr and Mrs William Elsey as they dined and threatening them with a gun. The couple and their maid were tied up by the men, who stole property and money. Labourer Thomas Lister was caught and confessed to being at the hall but said no more. He was hanged on 27 March. Thomas Strong and Timothy Brammer were executed in 1830, while Richard Poucher was transported in 1831.

15 February 1901 The steamship Homer was in collision with a Russian barque, 20 miles off the River Humber mouth. Homer was sailing between London and Newcastle, while the Russian ship headed for America. The foreign crew survived, and all but one seaman, McAllister perished on the Homer. Its wreck lies ion 26 feet of water; one of an estimated 50 in the river mouth.

Ten Familiar Landmarks - 1

One of the best-known sea marks of the Humber is the 309ft Dock Tower at Grimsby - taller than Lincoln Cathedral and made with about a million bricks. It was designed by J W Wild, who travelled widely in Egypt, Syria and southern Europe, gathering sketches of ideas, some of which he used ibn Grimsby. At its construction, it was the highest brick building in the country; its cast iron spiral staircase of 350 steps is the longest in the world. Although it looks ornamental, it was built as part of the hydraulic lock gates system. About 247 ft up is a 30,000-gallon capacity water tank. It was later used for washing down the fish markets and firefighting. On the northwest face is a plaque commemorating the men of the minesweepers who lost their lives in the Second World War. Unveiled in 1948, it is the only tribute of its kind to the minesweeping service, of which Grimsby was one of the largest bases.

St Germain's is a member of the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) which provides the simplest and most secure way for everyone to give to our church. By making a gift through PGS, they manage all the admin on our behalf, which makes a big difference to the church staff and volunteers.

When you set up a regular gift by Direct Debit with PGS, you can choose the frequency and amount of your gift and opt in to Gift Aid, if you are eligible. Through Gift Aid, we receive an extra 25p for every pound you give which makes a significant impact across the year.

There's also an option for you to increase your gift annually, with the peace of mind that you can adjust your gift at any time. One of the most important aspects of our choice to partner PGS to process gifts on behalf of this church, is that the giver always remains in control.

The quickest and easiest way to set up and manage your regular gift is online, through the PGS website.

It is also possible to make a one-off gift online, using a debit or credit card, Apple Pay or Google Pay.

SCOTHERN SPEED WATCH AND SPEED CAMERA REPORT JANUARY 2025

Below are the figures for the vehicles (and speeds) for vehicles passing through Scothern from 7 December 2024 to 4 January 2025 a total of 29 days.

Speed Watch - no sessions held during December.

Sign 1 on Dunholme Road

A total of 38,705 came into the village (average 1,335 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 46,825 left the village (average 1,615 per day) 97% less than 40 mph. The maximum speeds recorded: incoming 62 mph and outgoing 78 mph (13 December 2024 12:16).

Sign 2 on Sudbrooke Road

A total of 35,541 came into the village (average 1,226 per day) 90% less than 40mph and 26,386 left the village (average 910 per day) 87% less than 40mph. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 75 mph (8 November 2024 14:33) and outgoing 86 mph (22 December 2024 11:12).

Sign 3 on Main Street

A total of 16,642 came into the village (average 574 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 18,248 left the village (average 629 per day) 99% less than 40&. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 53mph and outgoing 71 mph.

Do these speeds worry you?

If you would like to help to reduce the speeding and you can spare a few hours a month, why not join the speed watch group? Volunteers are fully trained and go out in groups of three.

February Recipe

Stoned Beef (courtesy of Bette Vickers Bread 'n' if it.....)

INGREDIENTS

- 4 slices topside beef
- 1.5 oz flour
- 1 level teaspoon salt
- 1/4 level teaspoon pepper
- 1.5 oz lard
- 2 finely chopped onions
- 2 sticks celery
- 8 oz can chopped tomatoes
- 2 level teaspoons tomato puree
- Worcester sauce to taste
- 1/4 pint red wine

Method

- 1. Cut steak into 8 pieces and toss in seasoned flour until all used.
- 2. Melt lard and fry meat in this until brown.
- 3. Place meat in casserole dish.
- 4. Add onion and celery to remaining fat and fry until golden brown.
- 5. Add to meat, together with tomatoes, puree, sauce, wine and water.
- 6. Cover and cook in a moderate oven for two and a half hours until meat is tender.

The following is a summary of the Council Meeting held on Wednesday, 8th January 2025 5 councillors present and the clerk.

Councillor Co-option – We welcome Mark Unwin to the Council; Mark was co-opted as a new member of Scothern PC.

Play Area – Unfortunately following the annual play area inspection, several pieces of equipment have been highlighted as requiring urgent repairs, but due to the age of the equipment and the manufacturers no longer in business, a decision on Safety grounds was made to remove these and to seek quotes & research new equipment.

Flooding updates – Monday 6th January, after heavy rainfall – Craypool Lane flooded again. This was reported to Highways as AW sewer now repaired but excess rainwater still flows into the sewer pipe, highways don't have an excess rainwater pipe and the sewage system overflows. AW has confirmed that the upgrade work at Nettleham is complete and both pumps at our pumping station are fully functional.

Highways are due to inspect all gullies & drains in the coming weeks once emergency response is over. Cllr S Rawlins has been contacted.

Lincolnshire Quiz answers

- Katharine Swynford, who became the mistress to John of Gaunt, one of the sons of Edward III and was mother to four of his children. One of these children was John Beaufort from whom all of England's succeeding royal families can be traced. Katherine died in 1405 and is buried in Lincoln Cathedral.
- 2. Newport Arch (or Roman Northgate) which stands at the northern end of Bailgate, is the only Roman gateway in Britain still used by road traffic.
- 3. The circles mark the position of the colonnade that ran along the eastern side of the Roman forum (or marketplace) forming a covered way or portico.
- 4. The stone is set within the western wall of the tower of St Mary of Wigford and records the dedication of the church by Eirtig to the glory of Christ and St Mary.
- 5. As well as Lincoln Green there was Lincoln Grey, Lincoln Blanket and the most expensive of all Lincoln Scarlet.
- 6. The Lincoln Imp is a stone carving in the form of a small diabolical creature which can be found at Lincoln Cathedral. The buildings of the shrine of St Hugh wanted pilgrims to have in mind the ever-present danger of evil, so they included a reminder of the devil high up between two arches on the north side of the Angel Choir. The creature has become world famous as "The Lincoln Imp" and has become a symbol of Lincoln and is now popular with tourists trying to find "The Imp".
