Scothern News by its nature is informal, raw and unapproved. It is supported by Scothern Parish Council but does not represent "official" council views or opinions, nor are its reports of council meetings part of the formal minutes of the Council.

May is the fifth month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian calendars. Its length is 31 days. May is a month of spring in the Northern Hemisphere, and autumn in the Southern Hemisphere.

May's birthstone is the emerald which is emblematic of love and success. Birth flowers are the Lily of the Valley and Crataegus monogyna. Both are native throughout the cool temperate Northern Hemisphere in Asia, Europe and in the southern Appalachian Mountains in the United States, but have been naturalized throughout the temperate climatic world.

May (in Latin, *Maius*) was named for the Greek goddess Maia, who was identified with the Roman era goddess of fertility, Bona Dea, whose festival was held in May. Conversely, the Roman poet Ovid provides a second etymology, in which he says that the month of May is named for the *maiores*, Latin for "elders", and that the following month (June) is named for the *iuniores*, or "young people" (*Fasti VI.88*).

Eta Aquariids meteor shower appears in May. It is visible from about April 21 to about May 20 each year with peak activity on or around May 6. The Arietids shower from May 22 – July 2, and peaks on June 7. The Virginids also shower at various dates in May.

Historic events in May:

- 1471 The Battle of Tewkesbury, the last battle in the Wars of the Roses the Yorkists defeating the Lancastrians.
- 1707 The Union between England and Scotland is proclaimed.
- 1821 The"Little Corporal" [Napoleon Bonaparte] died aged 51 on the remote British island of St Helena.
- 1887 Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show opens in London.
- 1894 The official opening of the Manchester Ship Canal by Queen Victoria
- 1902 The Peace of Vereeniging ended the Boer War.
- 1940 Winston Churchill replaces Neville Chamberlain as British Prime Minister forming an all party war govenment. Churchill promised nothing but "blood, toil, tears and sweat".
- 1945 Germany surrendered to the Allies at Rheims (7 May) ending the war in Europe. VE Day is celebrated across Europe and North America on the 8 May.

They accept new potential donors from 16-30 and people remain on the register until age 60. There is also DKMS if you are over 30 but under 55 and you only need to be on one register. Joining is simple and although the vast majority of potential donors will never actually be a match for a patient it is beneficial to have a large amount of potential donors so that everyone needing a transplant has a better chance of finding a match. Imagine a loved one needing a transplant and no match can be found anywhere in the world, this happens quite often and is very scary for the patient and their family and friends. Because research now proves that younger donors lead to better outcomes for patients I would urge anyone between 16 and 30 to go on to the Anthony Nolan website and read up all about how to join and what happens if you are a match. Or pop in to see me over the May 10th/11th at the church and ask any questions you may have. My grandson recently joined and I know we have some young people in Scothern who have also joined which is very heartwarming for me personally. Obviously whether a person joins or not is a personal decision but some will put it off as they don't fully understand how it all works so I am happy to explain it all, and no question is a "silly" question. I knew very little about it until it was too late for me to join any register which I will always be rather annoyed about!

SCOTHERN SPEED WATCH AND SPEED CAMERA REPORT APRIL 2025

Community Speed Watch - there have been no sessions recently.

Below are the figures for the vehicles (and speeds) for vehicles passing through Scothern from 11 March 2025 to 7 April 2025 a total of 28 days.

Sign 1 on Dunholme Road

A total of 49,298 came into the village (average 1,761 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 59,246 left the village (average 2,115 per day) 97% less than 40 mph. The maximum speeds recorded: incoming 62 mph and outgoing 83 mph (3 April 2025 16:36)

Sign 2 on Sudbrooke Road

A total of 44,191 came into the village (average 1,578 per day) 91% less than 40mph and 33,627 left the village (average 1,201 per day) 87% less than 40mph. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming three greater than 70 mph and outgoing 78 mph (12 March 2025 11:15).

Sign 3 on Main Street

A total of 19,407 came into the village (average 693 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 21,682 left the village (average 774 per day) 99% less than 40mph. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 55 mph and outgoing 90 mph (13 March 2025 - 15:32).

Community Speed Watch is a scheme for volunteers working with the Parish Council, Lincolnshire County Council and Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership to address speed concerns in local communities using speed detection devices. The Police have responsibility for enforcement but the volunteers are there to raise awareness of speed issues in the community and improve driver behaviour.

Speed watch sessions only operate in daylight hours and in areas that have been identified by the Parish Council and the Police as being of concern. A minimum of three trained volunteers are needed to take part in each session, which is usually for an hour at a time. Volunteers are needed urgently to bring back the Community Speed Watch to Scothern. Full training is given and the equipment is provided.

Hello everyone,

In Action Fraud's new campaign, we are urging people planning to buy tickets or attend this summer's events and concerts to stay vigilant to criminals.

According to new data, £9.7 million was lost to ticket fraud in 2024 in the UK alone. Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a new ticket fraud awareness campaign, warning people to be alert to fraudsters trying to catch out people planning for popular and sold-out events.

Follow our top tips to avoid falling victim to ticket fraud.

- Only buy tickets from the venue's box office, official promoter or agent, or a well-known ticketing website.
- Avoid paying for tickets by bank transfer, especially if buying from someone unknown. Credit card or payment services such as PayPal give you a better chance of recovering the money if you become a victim of fraud.
- The password you use for your email account, as well as any other accounts you use to purchase tickets, should be different from all your other passwords. Use three random words to create a strong and memorable password, and <u>enable 2-step verification (2SV)</u>.
- Be wary of unsolicited emails, texts or adverts offering unbelievably good deals on tickets.
- Is the vendor a member of STAR? If they are, the company has signed up to their strict governing standards. STAR also offers an approved Alternative Dispute Resolution service to help customers with outstanding complaints. For more information visit <u>star.org.uk/buy safe</u>.
- If you think you've been a victim of fraud, contact your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud online at <u>actionfraud.police.uk</u> or by calling 0300 123 2040, or call Police Scotland on 101.

WELTON PDA

The PDA Spring lunch held on 11th April was once again a huge success. The total profit, after deduction of all expenses, was £836.10 for PDA funds. This was an increase of £267.18 on last years total. A huge thankyou to all who bought tickets, raffle tickets, cakes and cards. We hope you all enjoyed this event and will continue to support our other fundraising events. Thanks also to Welton Chippy who generously donated and rumbled the potatoes.

I have been asked to make clear the way we charge for PDA transport as there has been some confusion recently! The charge for trips to Welton health centre appointments is based on the village in which the patient lives. This will not vary regardless of where the driver lives. I have volunteer drivers who live in villages some distance from Welton but we ensure, through our fund raising, that they are paid 45p a mile in total. For any other medically related journey the charge to the patient is 40p per mile from the drivers door and back.

We anticipate getting additional transport requests following the announcement that the health centre is no longer able to offer certain services for example the removal of clips and stitches following surgery. Transport for these services will be charged at 40p per mile.

Pentecost: The Start of Something New

Much of our calendar is shaped by the Christian year. One example is Whitsun or Pentecost, which comes 50 days after Easter. The word Pentecost comes from the Greek pentekoste, meaning "fiftieth." Before it became a Christian celebration, it was a Jewish festival known as Shavuot—marking the harvest and the giving of the Ten Commandments.

After the first Easter, Pentecost took on new meaning. It became the start of the church and symbolized the beginning of a new world—one not driven by power or fear, but by fairness and equality.

In the Methodist Church, this principle remains central: all are equal, with no hierarchy of roles or people. Only Christ is elevated. Pentecost invites everyone into one family—God's family—on equal ground.

That first Christian Pentecost coincided with Shavuot, the day Jews remembered receiving the Ten Commandments. Those commandments gave people a moral and spiritual framework—but they were written on stone and often broken. Jesus gave a new commandment, written not on stone but in hearts: "Love one another as I have loved you."

Pentecost celebrates the coming of the Spirit, who helps us live out that commandment—to love God, love others, and love ourselves. It's a celebration of a new way of being.

So, whether you call it Pentecost, Whit, Whitsun, or Whit Sunday-have a happy one.

We litter picked, cleaned posts & paintwork, washed all the play equipment, swept bus shelters, carried out maintenance work in Grange Park and throughout the Village. Scothern Play Area – The council received & discussed 5 different quotes from playground companies to replace the old equipment and have approved Outdoor Play Devon Ltd to provide the new equipment for the younger children's area at the front of the village hall. Nettleham Rd Development working group – a meeting will be arranged for Wednesday 11th June at 6.30pm with the Director of Lindum Homes to discuss residents questions, issues & concerns.

Flooding issues - the council have approved work to jet/investigate the pipe across Grange Park, to understand why the area floods and clear any blockages. Highways have been investigating/jetting the pipes on Church St, Vicarage Lane and Sudbrooke Rd-Main St, the council are awaiting this report.
