June—abbreviated **Jun**—is the sixth month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian calendars—the latter the most widely used calendar in the world. Its length is 30 days. This month marks the start of summer in the Northern Hemisphere and contains the summer solstice, which is the day with the most daylight hours.

Several monsoons and subsequent wet seasons commence in the Northern Hemisphere during this month. Multiple meteor showers occur annually in June, including the Arietids, which are among the most intense daylight meteor showers of the year; they last between 22 May and 2 July, peaking in intensity on 8 June. Father's Day, which honours fathers and fatherhood, occurs on the third Sunday in June in most countries.

Historic events in June:

- 1162 Thomas Becket was consecrated as Archbishop of Canterbury.
- 1215 King John and his barons met on the banks of the River Thames at Runnymede and signed the Magna Carta, thus removing total authority from the monarchy forever.
- 1329 Scotland mourns the death of King Robert 1. Better known as Robert de Bruce, he earned a place in Scottish history for his legendary victory over the English at Bannockburn in 1314.
- 1579 Francis Drake drops anchor off the south-west coast of America and proclaims England's sovereignty over New Albion (California).
- 1675 Construction work starts on Sir Christopher Wren's St Paul's Cathedral in London.
- 1814 St Marylebone Cricket Club and Hertfordshire play the first ever cricket match at England's Lords Cricket Ground.
- 1917 In the midst of World War I the British royal family renounced German names (Saxe-Coburg-Gotha) and titles and adopted the name Windsor.
- 1944 D Day invasion of Normandy by one million Allied troops to liberate Western Europe from German occupation.
- 1953 Queen Elizabeth II's coronation took place in Westminster Abbey on a cold and wet day.

FROM THE LITTLE BOOK OF LINCOLNSHIRE (LUCY WOOD)

On this day in Lincolnshire					
12 June	This date is known as John Dalderby Day. Day was born in Horncastle and became Bishop of Lincoln in 1300. When he died, miracles were attributed to him including restoring speech to the people of Rutland, who could only bark. A service is held each year in Lincoln Cathedral.				

19 June 1215 Magna Carta was signed in Runnymede, Surrey. Lincoln Cathedral holds one of just four remaining copies. The Magna Carta was a charter of liberties between King John and rebel barons. The Charter of the Forest - providing rights for the common man - was issued in November 1217. Two copies remain, in Lincoln and Durham's Cathedrals. This Charter was in force until 1971.

Following the Good Shepherd

Many of you will be familiar with the 23rd Psalm, it's a well known and much loved bible passage. There's a modern version of a song called 'The Lord's my shepherd' (by Stuart Townend if you want to google it!) which has popped up on my playlist quite a bit and it made me think a little more on what Jesus really meant when he called himself the Good Shepherd?

I recently came across a funny YouTube clip which reminded me how tricky shepherding can be. In this video a sheep is stuck in a deep, narrow crack in the earth, with just its rear end sticking out. The shepherd manages to grab one of its back legs and, after much effort, pulls it out. Without any acknowledgement of its rescuer, the sheep skips off joyfully... only for it to fall headfirst back into the ditch literally seconds later! I've no doubt the shepherd dutifully rescued the sheep again, patiently and lovingly, but with a knowing smile on his face.

Sheep are curious creatures and often prone to distractions and scrapes! Dangers lie all around - thickets, ditches, predators and more - which is why they need a shepherd to protect, guard and guide and them in the right direction.

We can be very much like sheep sometimes, with many distractions to take us off path, and many dangers and difficulties we can get stuck in. Which is why we need Jesus as our shepherd. We hear in John's gospel that Jesus is the Good Shepherd, whose devotion to us is so strong that he 'laid down his life for the sheep'.

For Jesus, shepherding is more than just a job, it's a vocation fuelled by his love for us. On the cross, we witnessed his devotion to us in the clearest way, but three days later he rises again and love overcomes the pain of death. Jesus wins the victory for us all.

As we think about Jesus as the Good Shepherd, it's a good time to check in and reflect on where we're each going. Where are we being led? Who are we following? There is so much going on in the world it's sometimes hard to focus on what is good and right and true, it's so easy to be led off on a tricky path where we end up head first in a situation we'd really rather not be!

As we creep into the summer months full of hope, let's not forget to follow the path of love, peace, joy and hope. Let's keep listening. And as that funny video reminds us we can so often wander off track and find ourselves in sticky situations! But don't worry, the Good Shepherd will always be ready to help set us right again. Just keep listening to his voice, for he knows where we need to go.

SCOTHERN SPEED WATCH AND SPEED CAMERA REPORT MAY 2025

Community Speed Watch - no sessions held this month.

Below are the figures for the vehicles (and speeds) for vehicles passing through Scothern from 8 April 2025 to 6 May 2025 a total of 29 days.

Sign 1 on Dunholme Road

A total of 49,371 came into the village (average 1,702 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 59,781 left the village (average 2,061 per day) 97% less than 40 mph. The maximum speeds recorded: incoming 19 over 50 mph and outgoing 80 mph (5 May 2025 20:04). 17 vehicles exceeding 70 mph.

Sign 2 on Sudbrooke Road

A total of 42,832 came into the village (average 1,477 per day) 90% less than 40mph and 30,599 left the village (average 1,055 per day) 86% less than 40mph. The maximum speeds recorded: incoming 5 greater than 70 mph and outgoing 83 mph (21 April 2025 03:51). 9 vehicles exceeding 70 mph.

Sign 3 on Main Street

A total of 21,256 came into the village (average 733 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 24,431 left the village (average 842 per day) 99% less than 40mph. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 51 mph and outgoing 59 mph.

Community Speed Watch is a scheme for volunteers working with the Parish Council, Lincolnshire County Council and Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership to address speed concerns in local communities using speed detection devices. The Police have responsibility for enforcement, but the volunteers are there to raise awareness of speed issues in the community and improve driver behaviour.

Speed watch sessions only operate in daylight hours and in areas that have been identified by the Parish Council and the Police as being of concern. A minimum of three trained volunteers are needed to take part in each session, which is usually for an hour at a time. Volunteers are needed urgently to bring back the Community Speed Watch to Scothern. Full training is given and the equipment is provided.

Antisocial Behaviour can be reported in numerous ways. It is dealt with in a partnership approach. Whilst different agencies have responsibility for different areas of work once a report is made then they can decide who is best to take the lead. The most important thing is that it is reported in the first place.

Remembering Pope Francis: The People's Pope

When Pope Francis passed away, tributes poured in from around the world—honouring both the man and the position he held. Of all the titles he was given, the one that resonated most with me was "The People's Pope."

The Vatican described him as a "shepherd with the smell of the sheep," a phrase he coined shortly after his election in 2013 while addressing newly ordained priests. His message to them was clear and profound: be men who live among your people—laughing, crying, and walking with them. He urged them to "strip yourselves of pre-conceived ideas, dreams of greatness, and self-assertion, to place God and people at the centre of your daily life."

That philosophy shaped the entirety of his papacy and never wavered in the twelve years that followed.

At the very beginning of his ministry, Pope Francis washed the feet of the inmates of a young offenders' institution, an act that symbolized humility, and compassion. Near the end of his life, he emptied his personal bank account to support prisoners whom he visited personally. His actions always spoke louder than his words.

Now, as the world welcomes a new spiritual leader—Pope Leo, formerly Robert Francis Prevost—the media is abuzz with curiosity. But the true legacy of any Pope lies not in headlines, but in the lives they touch.

And that's true for all of us. While we may not influence the world on a global scale, the impact we have on those around us is just as meaningful. Pope Francis reminded us that to follow in Jesus' footsteps means practicing love in our everyday lives.

I wonder what the global impact would be if each of us chose to love more deeply in our own small corner of the world?

So, in the spirit of the Prayer of St. Francis:

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love. Where there is injury, pardon. Where there is doubt, faith. Where there is despair, hope. Where there is darkness, light. Where there is sorrow, joy. And in your service, Lord, May I be with you in Heaven forever. **Amen.**

At St Germain's church the bells are hung for full-circle ringing. This process evolved in England after the Reformation in 1547 but developed fully during the 17th century when a full wheel was attached to the bell, which allowed each ringer to control when their bell sounded, to a find degree. During the late 17th and early 18 Centuries "change ringing" was developed, whereby bells were rung to a predetermined mathematical order.

Bells hang in the "mouth" down position and have to be rung "up" before ringing can commence. The ringer does this by pulling the role repeatedly, gradually making the bell swing higher and higher until it rotates through a full circle every time the rope is pulled. Once this operation is complete the bell turns one complete circle at each pull of the rope, from mouth up to mouth up and back the other way, the bell striking once near the end of each revolution.

Having control over when the bell strikes a set of bells can be accurately rung in a sequence of predetermined orders - known as "change ringing". Wit the six bells at St Germain's the maximum number of changed (or extent) that can be rung, without repeating, is 720 changes (factorial 6 - 1x2x3x4x5x6). For a "peal" rung on six bells, it would be necessary to ring seven extents (5040 changes - which would normally take just under three hours to complete.

Five of the St Germain's bells were cast in 1887 and a sixth in 1889 by John Taylor & Co of Loughborough. The tenor, which is the heaviest bell, weighs in at 11 hundredweight (1132 lbs or 448.8 kg). During the 20th century, five generations of the Cade family rang at St Germain's with Charlie and his father Simon being in charge for the greater part of that period.

nb: Charlie Cade and his family lived at the Main Street end of Craypool Lane and Cade Close off Nettleham Road is named after Charlie. Charlie was a long-time stalwart of the village being involved at some point in all the village organisations.

If you are interested in joining the bell ringers who are part of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers, Central Branch then I am sure Jan Kenworthy who lives on Sudbrooke Road will be more than happy to put you in touch with the Tower Captain. Any member of the Parochial Church Council will also be able to point anyone interested in the appropriate direction!

Action Fraud Alert: rise of extortion phishing email reports

Action Fraud is urging the public to look out for phishing emails that relate to extortion as the Suspicious Email

Reporting Service (SERS) received over 2,924 reports in March 2025, a staggering increase compared to only 133 reports made in February.

The reported phishing emails received by the National Cyber Security Centre's SERS relate to a type of extortion referred to as 'Financially Motivated Sexual Extortion' (FMSE).

Reports suggests the phrasing of the email and subject lines can vary, but the theme remains consistent: the phishing email claims to have installed malware on the recipient's computer and recorded them visiting adult websites. The sender will then coerce the email recipient to pay a ransom demand by threatening to release the videos. The ransom is usually demanded in a form of cryptocurrency, such as Bitcoin.

In order to make these phishing attacks convincing, emails will often include genuine pieces of personal information relating to the victim, such as a password or home address. It is likely these would have been obtained from historic breaches of personal data.

Analysis shows that many people who received these emails also later reported becoming victims of online account hacking.

In 2024, a male victim in his thirties received numerous extortion emails that contained a password he used for one of his online accounts. The emails demanded a ransom of \$500. Having correctly identified the emails as a scam, he deleted them. However, shortly afterwards he noticed that he was unable to login to one of his social media accounts. After some checking, he realised that one of his bank accounts and multiple social media accounts had been hacked and he was locked out of them.

What to do if you receive an email like this:

- As with other phishing emails, do not to engage with the phisher, forward the email to <u>report@phishing.gov.uk</u>, which is the <u>NCSC's Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS)</u>, and then delete it.
- If you are considering paying the Bitcoin ransom, you should be aware that doing so, you will likely become the target of more scams, as the phisher will know they have a 'willing' customer.
- The inclusion of genuine passwords or other personal information in phishing emails is a strong
 indication that you may have been affected by a historic data breach. You can use this service to check
 which of your online accounts were affected: https://haveibeenpwned.com
- If the phishing email includes a password you still use, then change it immediately. Advice on how to create suitable passwords and enable other factors of authentication is available here: https://stopthinkfraud.campaign.gov.uk/protect-yourself-from-fraud/protecting-against-online-fraud/improve-your-password-security/

If you have been a victim of extortion or concerned that someone may be in possession of intimate images of you, you should report it to your local police force by calling 101.

EXTRAORDINARY USES FOR ORDINARY THINGS (Courtesy of Readers Digest)

Toothpaste:

Shine bathroom and kitchen chrome - *don't* bother buying expensive cleaners - the fine abrasive in non-gel toothpaste works just as well. Smear on the toothpaste and polish with a soft dry cloth.
