

August is the eighth month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian calendars. Its length is 31 days.

The month was originally named *Sextilis* in Latin because it was the 6th month in the original ten-month Roman calendar under Romulus in 753 BC, with March

being the first month of the year. About 700 BC, it became the eighth month when January and February were added to the year before March by King Numa Pompilius, who also gave it 29 days. Julius Caesar added two days when he created the Julian calendar in 46 BC (AUC 708), giving it its modern length of 31 days.

In 8 BC, the month was renamed in honour of Emperor Augustus. According to a Senatus consultum quoted by Macrobius, he chose this month because it was the time of several of his great triumphs, including the conquest of Egypt. Commonly repeated lore has it that August has 31 days because Augustus wanted his month to match the length of Julius Caesar's July, but this is an invention of the 13th century scholar Johannes de Sacrobosco. Sextilis had 31 days before it was renamed. It was not chosen for its length.

Historic events in August:

- 1100 King William II (Rufus) killed by a crossbow bolt in mysterious circumstances while hunting in the New Forest, his ghost is still said to haunt the woods!
- 1207 Liverpool is created a Borough by King John.
- 1646 Birth of John Flamsteed, Britian's first Astronomer Royal. He would go on to publish a catalogue that identified 2,935 stars.
- 1740 "Rule Britannia" sung for the first time in public, in Thomas Arne's "Masque Alfred".
- 1840 Britain bans the employment of climbing boys as chimney sweeps.
- 1881 Birth of Sir Alexander Fleming, Scottish discoverer of penicillin.
- 1900 Coca Cola is sold for the first time in Britain.
- 1963 Britain's Great Train Robbery £2.6m stolen from Royal Mail.



Change

I often view the month of August as a month of change. For many, August is a chance to change from work to play as people embark on a summer break. Students receive their GCSE and A Level results, and these results will determine which direction their lives will take next. At the end of August there will be younger children contemplating the change to 'big' school or the move to primary school. Being in the heart of an agricultural region, we see changes in the fields as the crops flourish ready for harvesting, fields of gold turned into dust by those monsters of the harvest, immortalised by the Worzels! However, as I am writing this in July, I have already seen bales in the fields, where only a few days ago I was admiring crops. Some crops are being harvested up to two weeks earlier than previous years due to the long dry spell that we have experienced. Yet another change!

Change is a part of life, but we often don't like change, we like the feeling of being comfortable and safe with familiarity. Change on the other hand brings uncertainty and fear of the unknown. This reminds me of the first episode of The Vicar of Dibley where Owen, Letitia and Jim agree that things must change; if traffic lights didn't change there would be chaos. They point out that there are good changes such as changing of the guard and bad changes like prawn flavoured crisps! Now there's a good discussion point!

Historically, changes have occurred over a long period of time, such as the evolution of buildings, from wattle and daub roundhouses to skyscrapers made of glass. However, technological advances have accelerated change. When the Wright brothers made the first powered flight in 1903, the thought of commercial space travel was even beyond the writings of H. G. Wells. When I was fighting to get my tuppence in the telephone box, little did I know that I would be able to make a call via a handheld device to anywhere around the world a handful of decades later.

It's easy to understand why people find the world hard to comprehend when change happens so quickly. The things that they have held onto for comfort are disappearing, replaced by the unknown. If they dare talk about when life was 'simpler', they are called dinosaurs!

When I was at primary school, there was a hymn that we used to sing. I can't remember much of it now but the line that I do remember is 'Everything changes but God changes not'. In this fast-changing world, we can find peace in knowing that God remains the same. God is faithful and keeps His promises and we can always rely on Him, even in uncertain times.

'When anxiety was great within me, your consolation brought me joy'. Psalm 94. v19.

Lincolnshire is home to a rich variety of fayres, carnivals, shows, and festivals that take place throughout the year. Iconic events like the Lincolnshire Show held at the Showground had something for everyone. Summer, in particular, brings a wave of outdoor events that naturally draw more attention. While every event is different, they all share one powerful outcome: bringing people together.

One event I'm especially looking forward to is the International Asylum Steampunk Festival over the August Bank Holiday. Held in and around the historic Lincoln Castle, it's the world's largest and longest-running Steampunk festival. It's a vibrant celebration of creativity and community, where people from across the globe—dressed in their distinctive Steampunk attire—come together to reconnect with old friends and make new ones.

Whether it's a small village fayre or an international gathering, these events highlight the joy of shared experiences and common interests.

As a church minister, I understand the deep importance of people coming together. Gathering in the company of others positively impacts our physical, mental, social, and spiritual wellbeing. Festivals provide a space for hundreds or even thousands to enjoy a shared moment safely. But smaller, more regular spaces—like coffee shops, pubs, community centres, online platforms, or churches—are just as vital. These places allow people to connect more intimately and build meaningful relationships over time.

In the early church, people met informally in homes. They shared meals, enjoyed fellowship, and listened to the apostles teach about the Christian faith, equipping them to serve their communities. These gatherings didn't specifically require everyone to hold the same beliefs—they simply valued being together.

That hasn't changed. Today, the church continues to be a place where people can step away from the busyness of life, reflect on their purpose, and find belonging in a supportive community.

SCOTHERN SPEED WATCH AND SPEED CAMERA REPORT JULY 2025

Community Speed Watch - no sessions held this month.

Below are the figures for the vehicles (and speeds) for vehicles passing through Scothern from 8 June 2025 to 5 |July 2025 a total of 28 days.

Sign 1 on Dunholme Road

A total of 55,138 came into the village (average 1,969 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 64,219 left the village (average 2,293 per day) 97% less than 40 mph. The maximum speeds recorded: incoming maximum 75 mph and outgoing 9 over 70 mph (maximum 86 mph - 23 June 2025 at 11:03).

Sign 2 on Sudbrooke Road

A total of 45,216 came into the village (average 1,615 per day) 90% less than 40mph and 33,501 left the village (average 1,196 per day) 87% less than 40mph. The maximum speeds recorded: incoming 2 greater than 70 mph, maximum 71mph and outgoing 7 greater than 70mph (maximum 79mph).

Sign 3 on Main Street

A total of 22,915 came into the village (average 818 per day) 99% less than 40mph and 26,345 left the village (average 941 per day) 99% less than 40mph. The maximum speeds recorded were incoming 51 mph and outgoing 57 mph.

Community Speed Watch is a scheme for volunteers working with the Parish Council, Lincolnshire County Council and Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership to address speed concerns in local communities using speed detection devices. The Police have responsibility for enforcement, but the volunteers are there to raise awareness of speed issues in the community and improve driver behaviour.

Speed watch sessions only operate in daylight hours and in areas that have been identified by the Parish Council and the Police as being of concern. A minimum of three trained volunteers are needed to take part in each session, which is usually for an hour at a time. Volunteers are needed urgently to bring back the Community Speed Watch to Scothern. Full training is given and the equipment is provided.

FROM THE LITTLE BOOK OF LINCOLNSHIRE (LUCY WOOD)

On this day in Lincolnshire

1 August 1645

Robert Jermyn's mansion on the banks of the Trent at Torksey was burned down during a skirmish. It had been seized by Parliamentarians in September 1644 and raiding Royalists from Newark Castle destroyed it.

23 August 1873

A train excursion from Lincoln to Skegness prompted a swarm of complaints from residents. It was reported that the raucous visitors -both male and female - decided to bathe nude on the beach "to shock the modesty of the natives" and visitors!



Saturday 23rd August 12-22:00 party in the car park.

Local bands, Outside and inside bar, Chow pizza, Bottle and glass BBQ, Crepe van, Stalls, Games, Face painting, Penalty shoot out.

Lincolnshire Facts:


Storytime for pre-school children continues every Tuesday at 9:30am and during the school holidays it is ok for older siblings to come along as well.



SCOTHERN PARISH COUNCIL CLIPS

This is a brief summary of the Parish Council meeting held on Wednesday, 9th July 2025. 5 councillors were presented and WLDC Cllr Baptiste Velan

Communications Strategy – councillors approve an action plan on communications; a new notice board on Dunholme Rd – one side for residents use; a new format for the monthly Scothern News to be delivered to all households and are looking for a new village/Parish Council logo.

Best Kept Garden Competition – Thank you to Mark Harris- MaxiMovers; Hammer & Nails; The Bottle & Glass and Scothern Nurseries who have all sponsored this year's competition and to Scothern Nurseries who have agreed to judge this year. Winners to be announced at a later date and prizes to be given at the Flower & Produce Show in September.

Barlings Solar Farm (Formally Dunholme Solar Farm) – a report/update was received from the Project Team, with only 25 residents responding to the public consultation out of 890 sent out, showing 47.6% supported proposals, 33.3% objected and 4.8% had no opinion and 14.3 didn't provide an opinion. Access will be from the A46The planning application will be submitted to WLDC this Summer -2025.

Litter picking – Thank you to the volunteers that attend the Litter picking event on the 5th July, the 4 councillors and 5 residents have helped to tidy up the village. We will plan another in a few months.

Bus Service – a new increased No.43 bus service has been announced but waiting for confirmation and timetable before able to publish. We have been made aware that the 11a may be stopping due to the increased No.43, also waiting for confirmation on this.

War Memorial – a faculty has been applied to refurbish the war memorial from the DAC, awaiting the decision.

Play Park – revised/updated quotes were received for Stage 2 of the play area refurbishment and requests of grant funding to be sent to WLDC. More details to follow. Stage 1 – area should be completed by Friday 18th July.

Grange Park – a policy was approved for Tree Management & Green Spaces and all trees within Grange Park will be surveyed for their condition and risk management. Two dead trees to be removed. A report was received from Ajet after the pipe across Grange Park was jetted.

CROMWELL IN ARMS

A major battle was fought at Winceby in October 1643 - probably Lincolnshire's most famous skirmish of the Civil War.

The Royalist garrison based at Bolingbroke Castle was under siege by Parliamentarians and 200 men killed as the castle was destroyed.

Royalist commander Sir Ingram Hopton was killed and given a military funeral in Horncastle. He was buried in St Mary's Church there, at Cromwell's express orders. Legend has it that Sir Ingram was decapitated, which frightened his horse so much that it galloped away, carrying is master's headless body in the saddle.
