Speed Awareness in Scothern

The current speed awareness data is shown for the period 6 July to 7 September 2025. This is for a two-month period as there is no Parish Council meeting in August. This also represents a period of school holidays and therefore sees less vehicles travelling into the village particularly on Sudbrooke Road.

The number of vehicles travelling at speeds in excess of 50mph and 70mph is unacceptable and in particular the maximum speeds recorded.

In order to seek support from the Police with this issue it would really help if we could resurrect the Speed Awareness Team.

- Set up an Instagram page along with our current facebook page for those who prefer social media.
- Launch a new parish council logo designed by one of our residents or Ellison Boulters Pupils.
- Develop an events calendar for Scothern that will include all upcoming events.

Grange Park



As an outsider who moved to Scothern two and a half years ago with my two Jack Russell terriers we explored the local footpaths. It was a bit of a shock to discover how few there were after the endless choice of paths in Lancashire and George and Basil didn't care for the sticky Lincolnshire mud. One day I was passing St Germain when I saw two people disappearing down off Church Road between a hedge and a house. Curious to know where they were going I followed. I walked along a dark path with a high fence on one side and a very tall conifer hedge on the other. I had discovered the gem that is Grange Park; I was surprised when I emerged at the end to see an open grassy space specially planted with trees, most spectacular being the Plane tree in the middle made even more beautiful by being allowed to have its branches with its huge leaves sweep down to the ground. It's unusual for a tree to be allowed to grow into its natural shape free from pruning or grazing. It also makes a great place for children to play.

I explored further and discovered that there was an orchard too. Any villager can help themselves when the fruit is ripe.

Thankfully there was also a very informative notice board which gave the details of the people who volunteer their time to look after it all. They were very friendly when I rang and I joined them on their next meeting and walk around.

Since then I have learnt more about the history of Grange Park and the people that looked after it over the years. I look forward to meeting others who have volunteered recently; Jake, Alison, Dawn and Steve. I have contributed to the environmental work this year by removing the hog weed by hand which was getting a little out of control. Weed killer is not used in Grange Park which means people are needed to do the work.

I have been keen to contribute as it is so important that we have as many green spaces as possible in the village for our physical and mental health, especially as we are going to be impacted by the new solar farm, and Grange Park is central to this.

Stories that Stay with Us

When I arrived in Lincoln two years ago, I promised myself I would take a guided walking tour of the city. I finally did so at the end of August with a delightful guide named Matthew. On a sunny Saturday morning, he led us through the streets of the old Roman city—once known as Lindum Colonia—beginning at the Magna Carta and ending three hours later at the Brayford Pool, the oldest inland harbour in England.

What struck me most was how seamlessly the past is woven into present-day life. Among the many tales Matthew shared, one in particular stayed with me: the story of a tennis ball wedged high in one of Lincoln Cathedral's archways.

In 1914, a young boy named Gilbert Bell and his pal found a good place to play with his tennis ball. They were bouncing the ball off the buttresses when it became stuck. Decades later, as the story was passed down through the family, Gilbert's nephew jokingly wrote to the cathedral asking for the ball's return. Remarkably, it was still there—making it, quite possibly, the world's oldest surviving tennis ball.

Stories like these help us see more than just bricks and mortar; they connect us to the people who came before us. Families pass them down, communities share them, and nations build identity upon them. Stories allow us to step into another person's shoes, and they often make complex ideas easier to grasp. Even works of non-fiction lean on storytelling to bring clarity. And of course, the Bible itself is rich with stories that carry wisdom and spiritual truth.

One of my favourites is the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25–37). At its heart, it is a simple tale of compassion: one man helping another in need, regardless of their differences. Yet its message continues to echo across centuries, with the power to transform lives and societies.

Gilbert's tennis ball story is charming—a delightful piece of Lincoln's living history. But the story of the Good Samaritan goes further. It calls us not just to remember, but to act. My prayer is that each of us might live as neighbours who notice, care, and respond with kindness, just as the Good Samaritan did.

Lincoln Friends of Anthony Nolan

Many of you will have a good idea of what our charity group does but for those who may not our purpose is to raise funds and to spread awareness for Anthony Nolan which is a national charity with various Friends groups and volunteers across the country. Funds go towards recruiting new potential stem cell donors to the Anthony Nolan register and some funds will go towards supporting patients through the transplant and recovery process, and also to other efforts including research. It costs around £40 to add each person to the register and they stay on until their 61st year. The likelihood is that person will never become a "match" for a critically person with blood cancer or other blood disorder but the more people we have on our registers worldwide then the better chance for each baby, child or adult who may need a lifesaving stem cell transplant.

During this summer there have been, as always, urgent appeals for new potential donors to step forward and sign up and rather sadly 3 of those appeals have been for people in the Lincoln area. These people have chosen to go public and allow Anthony Nolan to tell their stories in an effort to encourage people to join the register. One is a young man in his thirties, one a teenage boy and one is a mum of young twins who was diagnosed whilst having a routine scan when pregnant, she also has an older child. We went along to a fundraiser she was holding and Anthony Nolan sent us out some swab kits in case anyone wanted to join the register at the event. I had a box of 20 left over and managed to give them all out via Facebook village pages. These swab kits are quick and easy to use and just involve a cotton wool bud rubbed around the inside of the mouth and then being sent back to the laboratory where scientists do their magic. Much to our amazement and delight one young person who joined heard within a few weeks that he is a potential match for a patient and he is currently awaiting further news. He is beyond excited and so are we, watch this space!

To join the AN register you need to be 16-30 years of age but another register DKMS will accept people between 18-55, so please join one or the other if you can. Donating stem cells is a process like giving blood but takes longer. I am happy to go in to all the details if a person wants to chat about it before joining and there is very comprehensive info on both registers websites.

We are still having great success selling our lovely range of greetings cards and we now have our own special Lincoln Friends of Anthony Nolan Christmas card packs which are £4 for a pack of ten. We have 4 designs and these are now available at our forthcoming events or from us in Scothern. Just please email, text or call if you would like to see them and we can arrange that. We will be at Welton village hall for the monthly market on 9th October and 13th November from 9-12.




