A NEW LOOK FOR SCOTHERN PARISH COUNCIL

In 2026 the Council is keen to update its image and to be more accessible to residents. Councillors have developed a Communication Strategy Action Plan that we hope will enable residents to raise their views on what is important to them in Scothern and we want to raise the profile of what is going on in Scothern across all organisations.

Our first action has been to design a new logo. We are delighted that this has been designed by our newest Councillor Sian Watt Jones using posters drawn of Scothern and entered into the Scothern Flower and Produce Show by two students from Ellison Boulters Academy. The logo below incorporates key symbols of Scothern.



The following two pages show our poster setting out what Scothern Parish Council is and what it does. We are also producing a programme events for 2026 that will feature in next months Scothern News, this will identify what we are doing throughout the year, including formal meetings and informal get togethers to help improve Scothern. As always we really need your views to improve our communications.

Scothern Parish Council,

What is it & What does it do?

The graphic below shows the current position of Local Government; this will change with the reorganisation proposal for the Greater Lincolnshire Council, and more information will be provided on this when it is known in the future. This information sheet focuses on the third tier, the local level and the current position for Scothern Parish Council and what you can expect from it as a resident of Scothern.



In addition to the above, Scothern Parish Council undertakes the following responsibilities:

- Grange Park is a conservation area of land accessed via Church Street, Nettleham Road and The Alders. Grange Park has a Working Group made up of residents and Councillors, which is responsible for the development and maintenance of the land, under the instruction of Scothern Parish Council.
- To work with the Lincolnshire Resilience Forum and other Scothern Organisations to ensure Scothern has an emergency plan in place and is prepared and supported in case of an emergency situation.
- The Parish Council works with the responsible bodies to prevent flooding. Where flooding does occur, it can be contacted to provide sandbags and floodsax to help protection.
- Three speed indicator devices are provided throughout the village. The Parish Council is keen to restart the Speed Awareness Scheme with the help of residents.
- An annual Best Garden Competition, with prizes for the best categories, is held each year and winners are announced at the Village Hall Flower and Produce show. A Christmas decoration competition is also held throughout December.
- All Scothern planning applications are sent to the Parish Council for local consideration.

It is impossible to cover all activities of the Parish Council but fundamentally we wish to listen to the views of residents and support them where it is legitimate to do so.

Finances:

Parish Council's funding is allocated by the Local Authority as a percentage of Residents contribution to Council Tax this is called the Precept, and it is used by the Parish Council for the benefit of Scothern. For the past four years the Parish Council has aimed to work more productively and therefore requested a reduced contribution to support residents in a difficult financial climate. All financial information is published in the minutes of meetings and on the Parish Council Website.

Another year gone, time just seems to whizz by, and it is now my turn again to write an article for the magazine. This time I would like to share with you a poem I was given whilst on holiday.

Personally I found it very thought provoking.

It is called, "Did you Pray this morning?" (Anonymous)

I got up early one morning and rushed right into the day; I had so much to accomplish that I didn't have time to pray. Problems just tumbled about me, and heavier came each task. "Why doesn't God help me?" I wondered. He answered "You didn't ask." I wanted to see joy and beauty, but the day toiled on, grey and bleak; I wondered why God didn't show me. He said, "But you didn't seek." I tried to come into God's presence; I used all my keys at the lock. God gently and lovingly chided, "My child, you didn't knock." I woke up early this morning, and paused before entering the day; I had so much to accomplish that I had to take time to pray. How many of us do take time to pray each day? Do we pray just when we don't know which way to turn, or we have a crisis in our lives and need help, or do we assume that God knows what problems we face and will help us without us asking. If we do pray and it doesn't seem as if our prayers are answered do we then lose heart and think that God either does not hear us or does not care. Ask yourself, do we give our children everything they ask for?

But what is prayer? Putting it simply, maybe it is bringing ourselves into the presence of God; whatever we need or wish to say to him, we take ourselves into his presence. There are many examples in the Bible of Jesus teaching about prayer, the most well known is probably where the disciples ask Jesus to teach them how to pray and he teaches them the prayer that we know as the “Lord’s Prayer”.. Jesus’ message to his disciples, and that includes us, is that we should persist in prayer, pray continually, take ourselves into the Father’s presence, and trust him to provide what we need. But we need to ask for his help – to pray to him, we need to take ourselves into his presence. Prayer can also be recognising God’s love for us, thanking him, praising him and glorifying his name.

Jesus taught his disciples how to pray but prayer was around long before Jesus’ time. Ancient civilisations worshipped their “gods”, and today a common factor in the various religions of the world is that they all use prayer.

Prayer is a very personal thing and it is something you can do anytime, anywhere, silently or out loud, the choice is yours.

Let us pray for a very happy and healthy 2026

Stories that Stay with Us

When I arrived in Lincoln two years ago, I promised myself I would take a guided walking tour of the city. I finally did so at the end of August with a delightful guide named Matthew. On a sunny Saturday morning, he led us through the streets of the old Roman city—once known as Lindum Colonia—beginning at the Magna Carta and ending three hours later at the Brayford Pool, the oldest inland harbour in England.

What struck me most was how seamlessly the past is woven into present-day life. Among the many tales Matthew shared, one in particular stayed with me: the story of a tennis ball wedged high in one of Lincoln Cathedral's archways.

In 1914, a young boy named Gilbert Bell and his pal found a good place to play with his tennis ball. They were bouncing the ball off the buttresses when it became stuck. Decades later, as the story was passed down through the family, Gilbert's nephew jokingly wrote to the cathedral asking for the ball's return. Remarkably, it was still there—making it, quite possibly, the world's oldest surviving tennis ball.

Stories like these help us see more than just bricks and mortar; they connect us to the people who came before us. Families pass them down, communities share them, and nations build identity upon them. Stories allow us to step into another person's shoes, and they often make complex ideas easier to grasp. Even works of non-fiction lean on storytelling to bring clarity. And of course, the Bible itself is rich with stories that carry wisdom and spiritual truth.

One of my favourites is the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25–37). At its heart, it is a simple tale of compassion: one man helping another in need, regardless of their differences. Yet its message continues to echo across centuries, with the power to transform lives and societies.

Gilbert's tennis ball story is charming—a delightful piece of Lincoln's living history. But the story of the Good Samaritan goes further. It calls us not just to remember, but to act. My prayer is that each of us might live as neighbours who notice, care, and respond with kindness, just as the Good Samaritan did.

We have some exciting news (at least we think it's exciting) Below you will see that we have a new and hopefully better way for patients to book transport. This is something which we have been working on for some time now along with Simon Carter of SCIS Computer Services.

Once it is up and running, we are happy to explain/ demonstrate how to use the service if anyone is unsure. Please read the details of the service below.

The PDA has been trying to develop a new way for patients to book our transport service. This is now almost complete and in early 2026 we hope to be able to provide a link on the Welton Family Health Centre website where you can request transport. It will be an online form that can be accessed by computer or mobile phone. We hope that this will reduce the workload of the Health Centre staff and also provide a quicker way to make a booking rather than waiting in a queue on the telephone. This service is for medical appointments e.g. hospital, dentist, physio, opticians etc. It is not for transport to the Health Centre which should be booked directly with the Health Centre in the usual way.

Please check the Health Centre's website home page (<https://www.weltonsurgery.co.uk>) where you will soon find a link to access our services. This will take you to the PDA transport booking form.

We hope to be able to provide more information once a go live date has been fixed for this new service.

GRANGE PARK

The leaves in Grange Park have nearly all fallen as I write although by the time you are reading this article they should all be down. We may all be snowed in, who knows, but even as the last few leaves hang on, already the bulbs on the spring bulb bank are pushing through. Are these very early? I'm not sure, but I know that Rosey spotted some *narcissi* in the village in November. The extreme weather is definitely playing havoc with nature.



The bare trunks look particularly striking at this time of year. The London Plane, which in my opinion is the best tree in Grange Park, is renowned for its peeling bark. Now the tree is reaching maturity this is becoming more evident. The large fallen leaves create a circle marking the extent of the canopy of the tree and I think it really visually sets it off against the green of the grassed area.



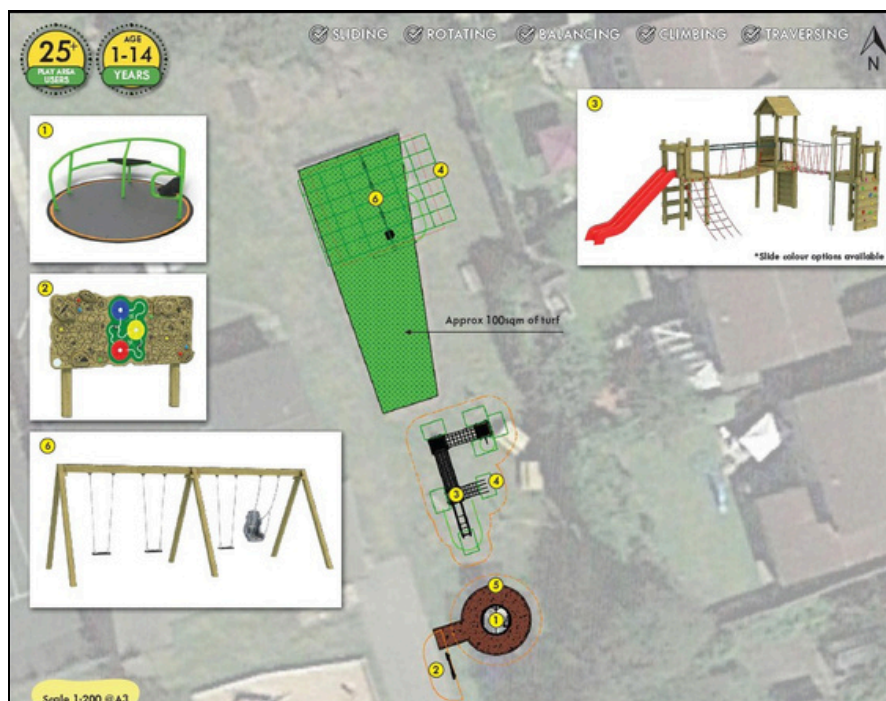
The other trunks I think look particularly stunning belong to the multi stemmed lime. We are very proud to have resurrected this plucky tree. The original lime tree died back to such an extent, mainly due to the proximity of the hedge, that it was deemed to be completely dead and was cut down at ground level in 2016. The next spring it began to sprout from the stump, and John Good, our chairman at the time, suggested we allow two or three of the shoots to grow and cut back the others. After 9 years we now have the resulting multi-stemmed lime which is a great addition to the park.

Grange Park is not its usual haven of peace as the work starts on the development site on Nettleham Road. In time when this is all finished, the houses will be landscaped and the new residents, our new neighbours, I hope will come to appreciate having Grange Park on their doorstep. Maybe they will even join our management group and take an active part in caring for the park. In the meantime, please have a stroll round and enjoy the austere beauty of the trees and keep an eye on the Spring bulb bank as it bursts into life.

Further Information about exciting changes to Scothern Play Park

In previous additions of Scothern News we have informed you of the planned changes to Scothern's play park. The under 5's area is complete and the older childrens play area is currently being prepared for the addition of a new swing set of flat swings and an inclusive support seat for accessibility.

The Parish Council is now delighted to announce that it has received grant funding from West Lindsey District Council to further improve the area. As shown below the area will now also include a timber tower with swing, an accessible roundabout and a finger maze. All set on the appropriate safety flooring. The items chosen reflect the requests identified in last years play equipment survey. Work will begin to take place in February 2026.





Lincolnshire County Council extends Woodland Trust partnership

The move means thousands more trees and hedgerow plants in Lincolnshire soil.

Lincolnshire County Council has renewed its partnership with the Woodland Trust for 2026-28 in a move that will mean thousands more trees being planted across Lincolnshire.

The renewal will support the planting of 217,900 more trees, a figure up from the 207,000 that went in the ground during the last team-up which ran from 2024-26. That's a huge amount of trees going into Lincolnshire soil that would cover the equivalent of more than 60 football fields.

12 extra miles of hedgerow will be planted too, in total that will mean tree cover for the equivalent of around 2,000 double-decker buses end-to-end.

The news is particularly important given that canopy cover provided by trees and hedgerows in the county is currently only 4%.

Scothern Parish Council News

- The meeting on Wed, 10th Dec 2026 was attended by Cllrs Jane Johnson, Barnaby Patchett, Jackie Atkins & Robert Creaser with apologies from Cllrs Derek Canton, Mark Unwin & Sian Watt Jones
- The 2026/27 Budget was set with a Precept of £30,000
- Our WLDC Community Grant Funding request of £21,000 for new play area equipment was approved, now we can commence with the next 2 stages of the play area improvements in the new year.
- Following a tree safety survey, 2x dead trees are to be removed from the car park on Sudbrooke Rd
- The car park has been cleared of all weeds/overgrowth, overhanging low tree branches have been removed, the grass cut and the signage cleaned.
- The Faculty to refurbish the War Memorial has now been approved and the Stone Masons will complete the work in the first half of 2026. The Parish Council have paid the faculty fee and an extra £500 for a granite stone base at the request of the DAC and towards the cost of adding the 3 missing names.
- Flooding is still reported on Craypool Lane whenever there is heavy rainfall. Both Anglian Water & Lincolnshire County Council received reports on each occasion and LCC Cllr Jane Smith is chasing Highways to get the issue resolved.
- The road sweeper has been requested several times to clear the leaves/straw etc throughout the village but hasn't arrived. WLDC Cllr Baptiste Velan is chasing West Lindsey
- Requests has been submitted to LCC in the last 2 months to clear the blocked drains/gullies especially on Main St and Sudbrooke Rd but we have been informed that it isn't a priority at this time - very disappointing to hear
- The footpath joining Sudbrooke Rd to Orchard Close was surfaced by LCC but reports have been received from residents that it is a trip hazard/uneven surface –this has been reported.
- The next Parish Council meeting is a week earlier, Wed 7th January

Garden Waste Collection Service 2026

West Lindsey District Council provide an opt in garden waste collection service which operates from end of March until end of November, providing residents with 18 collections. The garden waste bins are collected fortnightly during this period as per resident's collection calendars.

The cost of the service is for collections in 2026 is £48 per bin. Residents can subscribe for more than one if they wish to. There are no subsidies for subscribing part way through the year.

To guarantee that you receive all 18 scheduled collections please ensure that you subscribe to the service by Monday 2 March 2026.

Residents that subscribe to the garden waste service will receive a welcome pack containing a paid for sticker in the post. The sticker needs to be placed at the rear of your bin under the handles, this allows our operatives to identify paid for bins. Please ensure that on the day of collection the sticker is facing the road and is visible for our operatives. If you do not display your sticker, it may result in the bin not being emptied.





Report it - Use our online forms to report an issue or tell us about a change. It's the quickest and cheapest way to contact us. No waiting and your report will go straight to the correct service area whatever time of day you report it.

- Bins – collection day/missed, waste, fly tipping, abandoned vehicles, dog waste bins, litter, ASB, street cleaning, street name plate damage.
