This month a Big Thankyou goes to Melanie Tointon for delivering to Saxon Fields, Northing Lane, Main Street and Meadow Close




Speed Awareness in Scothern



The Charts displayed show the average daily traffic coming into and out of our three roads with speed indicator devices in Scothern for each month during 2025.

The amount of daily traffic is highest on Dunholme Road at around 2000 cars coming into and going out of the village each day, this is slightly less for Sudbrooke Road at around 1200, although this does decrease during school holidays, finally Main Street sees the least traffic at around 700 per day. With this number of vehicles travelling throughout the village and the number of those recorded at excessive speeds. We will be looking to form a new speed awareness team in 2026.

I hope all Scothern residents enjoyed a happy Christmas and a wonderful New Year. I'm sure that, like me, many of you have had a tipple or two in the Bottle and Glass. But I wonder how many of you, on your way in, have stopped to think about the pub's rather unusual entrance porch.

As it happens, this porch was originally the south entrance to the village church. When the church was altered in 1776, the doorway was removed—and, not wishing to waste good stonework, someone decided to upcycle it to the front of the pub. I wonder how back in the day how many babies were carried through that doorway to be christened, how many couples passed beneath it to be married, and how many villagers made their final journey through it to be buried. Thousands, I should think.

My own christening through that doorway at sixteen was of a rather different nature—the baby's head was certainly well wetted! Over the years many newlyweds celebrated their reception in the B&G, and I've even witnessed a few souls being carried out through the porch after an evening that proved a little too enthusiastic.

If only that porch could talk... though perhaps, on reflection, it's just as well it can't!

As we get older our music tastes can change and with that an appreciation of a wider range of genres anything from classical to country and western.

Dependent on our mood can dictate what music we want to listen to, but music has that unique ability to penetrate our innermost being and can have a beneficial and soothing impact on our state of mind and easing our emotions.



Ash Wednesday: Marking the Start of a Meaningful Journey

The Christian calendar offers a gentle but steady rhythm for the spiritual life, helping us to pause, to reflect and refocus amid busy days. As the next month begins, so too does one of the most important seasons in the church year: Lent, a seven-week journey that leads us to the celebration of Easter.

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, a holy day traditionally set aside for prayer, fasting and reflection. Coming straight after Shrove Tuesday (17th February), when pancakes are enjoyed and cupboards cleared, Ash Wednesday marks a change of pace. Many churches hold simple services to signal the start of this contemplative season.

There is a quietly powerful simplicity to an Ash Wednesday service. People gather in a more reflective, even repentant, mood than usual. One of the most striking moments comes when ashes are gently placed on a person's forehead, marked with the shape of a cross.

As the service unfolds, we are reminded of our human frailty, our need for God, and God's deep love and mercy. The ashes themselves are usually made from last year's palm crosses — a meaningful link between celebration and humility, joy and reflection.

I remember taking part in an Ash Wednesday service a few years ago and then heading straight into hospital to visit a patient, the mark of the ashes still clearly on my forehead. I received some puzzled glances - has this man forgotten to wash his face! A few people even asked what had happened to me as I didn't look "normal", but that was exactly the point. Those ashes on my face sparked curiosity and conversation, reminding me that faith invites us to stop and think, especially in such a fast-moving world.

The slower pace of Lent matters, because it gives us time. Time to slow down, to be honest ourselves, and to reflect on our relationship with God and with others. Many people choose to give up something, or to take up something positive during Lent – not as a punishment, but as a way of creating space for prayer, generosity and kindness.

Ash Wednesday reminds us that Lent is about opening our hearts – so that when Easter arrives, its message of hope and new life can truly be felt and shared by us all.





In the past amongst the items donated have been a carbon monoxide detector, 2 hours gardening services, a free vehicle MOT, a steering wheel lock, a 1 off house clean, window cleaning services and an afternoon tea hamper. The next PDA event will be the Spring lunch to be held on 10th April. I will post details of the menu in the next magazine. Following a committee meeting last night, 8th January, it was decided to keep the cost of a ticket for the Spring lunch to £8 the same as last year. Tickets will have to be strictly on a 1st come 1st served basis, limited to 100 and will go on sale on Monday 2nd March. The Christmas lunch was fully sold out leaving no tickets for the health centre staff but I will ensure 4 tickets are set aside for them for the Spring lunch.

West Lindsey Food Waste Recycling

Food waste recycling is a new service being introduced across West Lindsey in 2026, as part of the UK Government's Simpler Recycling legislation.

Food waste collections will be collected weekly on your usual bin collection day. Collections will commence from 30 March 2026. Between Monday 2 February and Friday 2 March 2026 WLDC will deliver everything you need to be able to recycle your food waste. This includes:

- a 5 litre indoor kitchen caddy for collecting food scraps
- a 23 litre outdoor food waste caddy, a larger outdoor caddy for kerbside collection
- liners – to help keep your indoor caddy clean (an initial supply of caddy liners for your kitchen caddy)

Parish Council News

Wed, 7th January PC meeting - 5 councillors present with LCC Cllr Jane Smith and a resident for part of the meeting.

- A resident spoke on the flooding on Craypool Lane and the issues trying to get both AW & HW's together to help to solve the problems with the sewers and surface water drainage. Cllr J Smith to arrange a meeting with all authorities to include the PC & resident affected.
- A grant funding request from St Germain's PCC to repair the Church Clock was approved
- The proposed one-way on Church St only received 19 responses from residents: 12-FOR and 7 AGAINST


